

## Jury Recommends Better Bridges, Base Line Signs

A Hornby woman died of a ruptured aorta minutes after a compact car driven by her daughter slammed into a bridge abutment on the Base Line near her home, a coroner's jury found.

Bertha Grexton, 45, was trapped between the dash and the right door of the wrecked car, said Constable Robert Burke of the North Halton OPP detachment. The door had to be pried open to release her.

Mrs. Grexton was still alive shortly after the accident, the constable testified. But coroner Dr. Graham Owen, reading a medical report, told the jury injured woman was dead on arrival at Oakville - Trafalgar Memorial Hospital.

Susan Lynn Grexton, 16, said she was driving her mother and younger sister home from Milton on the afternoon of May 13.

### Watching Horses

"I was watching horses in a field to the right of the road," said Miss Grexton. "Suddenly my mother screamed and grabbed for the wheel."

Miss Grexton said she didn't feel the car go off the road before striking the bridge abutment. Her speed before the accident had been 50 mph but she slowed to see the horses.

There were no other cars in front or behind her parents' car and no oncoming traffic, Miss Grexton testified. She was a learner-driver and had renewed her first 90-day permit the day of the accident.

James Death, 13, of Hornby, was the only eyewitness. He said he was sitting in a friend's car some distance from the bridge.

"I saw this white car and it looked as if it was going into the bridge," said Death. "The car was going over the white line onto the north side of the road. When it was about twenty feet away, it suddenly swerved into the south side of the bridge."

Coroner Owen said Death's evidence was consistent with what police had found. At the death scene which the jury visited before the inquest, constable Burke stressed the absence of skid marks and said the car ended up at a 45 degree angle to the bridge.

The slight damage to the abutment is mute testimony to the terrible impact that can result from a speed of 45 to 50 mph, said Crown Attorney Peter McWilliams in his summation to the jury. "I suggest the motorist should be protected by guardrails, even if he is careless."

Earlier, Mr. McWilliams questioned Jack Corbett, a county roads engineer with eight years experience in Dufferin County before coming to Halton last year.

Mr. Corbett said the death bridge was only 20 feet 3 inches wide, curb to curb. It had been built in 1938, when such narrow widths were acceptable according to traffic conditions then prevailing.

Further questioning revealed that shoulders on the Base Line are only four feet wide all the way from Milton to Hornby, exactly half of today's minimum standard width.

The jury, returning after an hour's deliberation made two main recommendations:

That Halton County immediately install "narrow bridge" signs on the Base Line bridges.

That Halton County works department bring the three bridges up to present day Department of Highways requirements in view of heavy Base Line traffic.


