

Elevate Connell Smith Jaycee Senate Chamber

The Georgetown Jaycees held a Ladies' Night for their wives and guests at North Halton Golf & Country Club Tuesday, May 22, where Julian Reed, sang a selection of folk songs accompanying himself on a banjo.

It was at the meeting that Mr. G. Connell Smith was presented with his Senatorship. This is presented to a member who has been outstanding in his work with the Jaycees movement, and gives him lifetime membership in the Senate of Junior Chamber International.

Mr. Connell Smith, who is married with three children and employed as an electrical engineer with Varian Associates Georgetown, has been connected actively with the Jaycees over the past eight years.

Born and educated in Montreal, where he graduated with a degree in Electrical Engineering from McGill University. Connell Smith joined Montreal Junior Board of Trade in 1959. In 1960 he transferred to the Chamadey Jaycees where he held position of treasurer, followed by that of vice-president in 1961. In 1962 he moved to Georgetown where he transferred to Georgetown Jaycee unit as a member.

In 1963-64 Connell held the position of secretary, followed by vice-president 1964-65, becoming President in 1965-66. Connell took presidency of the unit at its lowest ebb, boasting only 7 members. By the time his term of office was finished the unit had grown to 35 active members.

For the past year, 1966-67, he has held the position of vice-president of District 5 Jaycees as well as position of past-president within Georgetown unit and has seen the unit grow even further to an active membership of 56 persons.

Also present during the evening was Mr. Hardy Merker, President of District 5, who gave a talk on the Aims and Purposes of Jayceettes, mainly for the benefit of Jaycee wives present who are forming a Jayceette organization in Georgetown.
