Charlie Biehn and Jane McNally will represent Georgetown District High School at the Ontario Athletics Leadership camp this summer. The camp, sponsored by the Department of Education, is situated on Lake Couchiching and runs for the months of July and August.

The course is of a two week duration. The girls have two sessions in July, the boys in August. In all, a total of 768 students attend the camp over the summer.

The campers are grade eleven students who place in the top third of their grade academically, and are above average athletically. At camp the students receive advanced training in activities of their choice and are also exposed to activities not commonly offered at their own high schools.

Instruction is provided by some of the most highly qualified Physical Educators in the province.

During their two weeks the students are presented with numerous opportunities to cultivate and display their leadership potential. They plan, organize, administrate and evaluate sports tournaments and track meets. They prepare their non-denominational church service, camp fires and their closing banquet.

It is an extremely full and physically active two weeks spent with 192 students from different high schools throughout

## Heavy Smoke Damage, Kennedy St. Home Fire

Damage may run as high as \$11,000 the result of a Monday night fire in a Kennedy Street home.

Fire Chief Erwin Lewis said flames were kept to a temporary kitchen on the west side of the house, but heavy smoke damage was done to rooms and contents throughout.

A pot of grease which boiled over on a range in the small ground floor room was blamed for the fire.

Danny Engleby, age 16, smelled smoke while watching TV, and ran upstairs and alerted his grandfather. Both inhaled smoke on the way to the door and had to be given oxygen.

Flames licked out a back window at the height of the blaze damaging exterior paint and buckling several lengths of aluminum siding.
