Student Nurse First Aid, Stems Blood At Accident

Occupants of a car which hit a fence and hydro pole and rolled over opposite the BP service station in Norval Saturday midnight were saved from serious losses of blood by a student nurse who happened on the accident scene.

Joyce Rundle of Georgetown, a student at Guelph General Hospital's school of nursing, applied first aid to Shirley Ann Cookson, and Douglas Davy, both of Brampton, to stem the flow of blood from severe lacerations.

Ontario Provincial Police said Miss Cookson was driving the late model car. Damage was estimated at \$2,000.

Miss Cookson was treated in hospital for deep cuts to her scalp and hand, and Davy for severe head cuts.

It was the worst of four accidents on the Georgetown outskirts during the week.

Monday morning, cars operated by Arthur Stanley Ellis, of Georgetown, and John Douglas White of R. R. 2 Norval, collided on the 9th Line at No. 10, sideroad doing \$100 damage to each vehicle.

Three drivers escaped serious injury Saturday when a car ran into a parked pickup truck and a station wagon on the 4th Line of Esqueving. The car, driven by John Camille LaRoque, of Gibbons Place, Georgetown, sustained \$300 damage.

Damage to the station wagon driven by Vernon Pickett, RR 2 Georgetown, was estimated at \$500 and to the station wagon driven by Harold Brown, 5th Line Esqueving, \$75.

The same day, cars operated by Charles Fessenden, Rosemount, and Oswald McConkey, RR 2, Elora, came together on No. 7 Highway at Norval to the tune of \$275.

Former Georgetown Merchant Was Lions Charter Member

A prominent Georgetown businessman from 1914 until he retired in 1948 and moved to Toronto, David Brill died suddenly on Tuesday evening, May 18 at the age of 79.

He was the son of the late Isaac and Sarah Brill and came to Canada from Galicia, Austria-Hungary in 1904 at the age of 18. He first lived in Toronto, and in 1914 opened a small clothing store on Main Street South. When he married Anne Finkelstein of Toronto in 1918, they took up residence on John Street. Later that year he acquired the property at Main and Mill formerly occupied by the Adams Department store, and conducted a clothing and shoe business there until 1948 when he sold the business to Cotton Brothers. He was also a partner in the Brill Knitting Co. which operated on Water Street in what is now an apartment building.

A member of Credit Masonic Lodge and a charter member and past president of Georgetown Lions Club, he always took keen interest in municipal affairs. His friends will remember one incident — when some 30 Armenian orphans were brought to Georgetown from that war-torn country he decided to do something special for them. He went to the farm school, measured each boy and had caps made up for them to order.

Before joining Temple Sinai congregation, he was affiliated with the conservative synagogue B'nai Israel Beth David.

He leaves his wife Anne, six children, Mrs. George Novak (Esther), Jack and Donald of Toronto, Arnold of Paris, France, Mrs. M.B. Wong (Beatrice) of Orton and Bernard of San Francisco, California; and fourteen grandchildren; and one brother Jack of Toronto. He was predeceased by a brother Joseph and sister Mrs. Donna Ellen Bohnen of Toronto and a brother Bernard of New York City.

Funeral service was held at Temple Sinai on May 18 with interment at Dawes Rd. Cemetery. Temple Sinai section; pallbearers were Ben Rachlin, Acton; nephews Neil Bohnen and Edward Brill and grandsons Stephen Brill, William Novak and Danny Brill, all of Toronto.
