Norval residents are rather bewildered after reading in last week's Georgetown Herald that we will be paying the highest rate of taxes in Esqueving twp. and are wondering how come we are selected for this honour? How come when we have the least we pay the most? How come such a big jump in our fire protection rate? How come we pay more for our street lights than Glen Williams? How come our school tax has jumped so high when we have the smallest school?

A friend who knows the whys and wherefores tried to explain in a few brief minutes to this confused ratepayer with not too great a success.

In Esqueving the taxes for the county are the same, but for the township are the same, but for the school tax the township is divided into 3 sections of Georgetown, Milton and Acton. Each section covers the same area as the high school in each town, therefore Norval is in the Georgetown section. The rate is based on the assessment. Norval does not have as many homes or businesses as other sections so our rate is higher. Seems as if it is because we have the least we pay the most in this case.

Most taxpayers believe that the high jump in the school tax is the result of the big addition to the Stewarttown school for Grades 7 and 8 of Esqueving Township and the addition to Milton High School, however, the debentures on these schools are not set yet so they have not affected our taxes as yet but we have this to look forward to in the near future.

Norval hydro is serviced by rural Brampton which apparently has a little higher rate than Georgetown from which Glen Williams is serviced so Glen Williams street lights are on a lower rate.

Our village is in the Georgetown Fire area which had a much higher jump in the mill rate than the other two Fire

areas of the township so this has raised our rate.

Still confused and find it all as clear as mud? Me too!

Some irate ratepayers are talking about a protest meeting, others say it would be useless and just a waste of time, but one thing is sure — the most popular subject of conversation in the village this week is taxes, how the mill rate is reached and how come when we have the least we have to pay the most?

Says Fire Protection Adequate for Apartm't

Fears that a new 4-storey apartment building would not have adequate fire protection were allayed at Monday's council meeting.

John Hole, 33 Windsor Rd. said he is concerned about the protection the fire department can offer to a new apartment building built at Maple and Guelph Streets.

He was told by Cr. Fred Harrison that building height is not an important factor and that regulations call for fire hydrants on every floor of such a building.

"For instance, the Toronto department cannot have ladders which reach to the top of the Toronto-Dominion building," he explained.

Cr. Jim Young said the building-by-law allows buildings 35 feet in height and the new building is not classed as a high rise apartment.

"We also have the co-operation of our hydro" added Deputy Reeve Speight. "They have equipment available which can evacuate people from upper storeys of buildings in an emergency."
