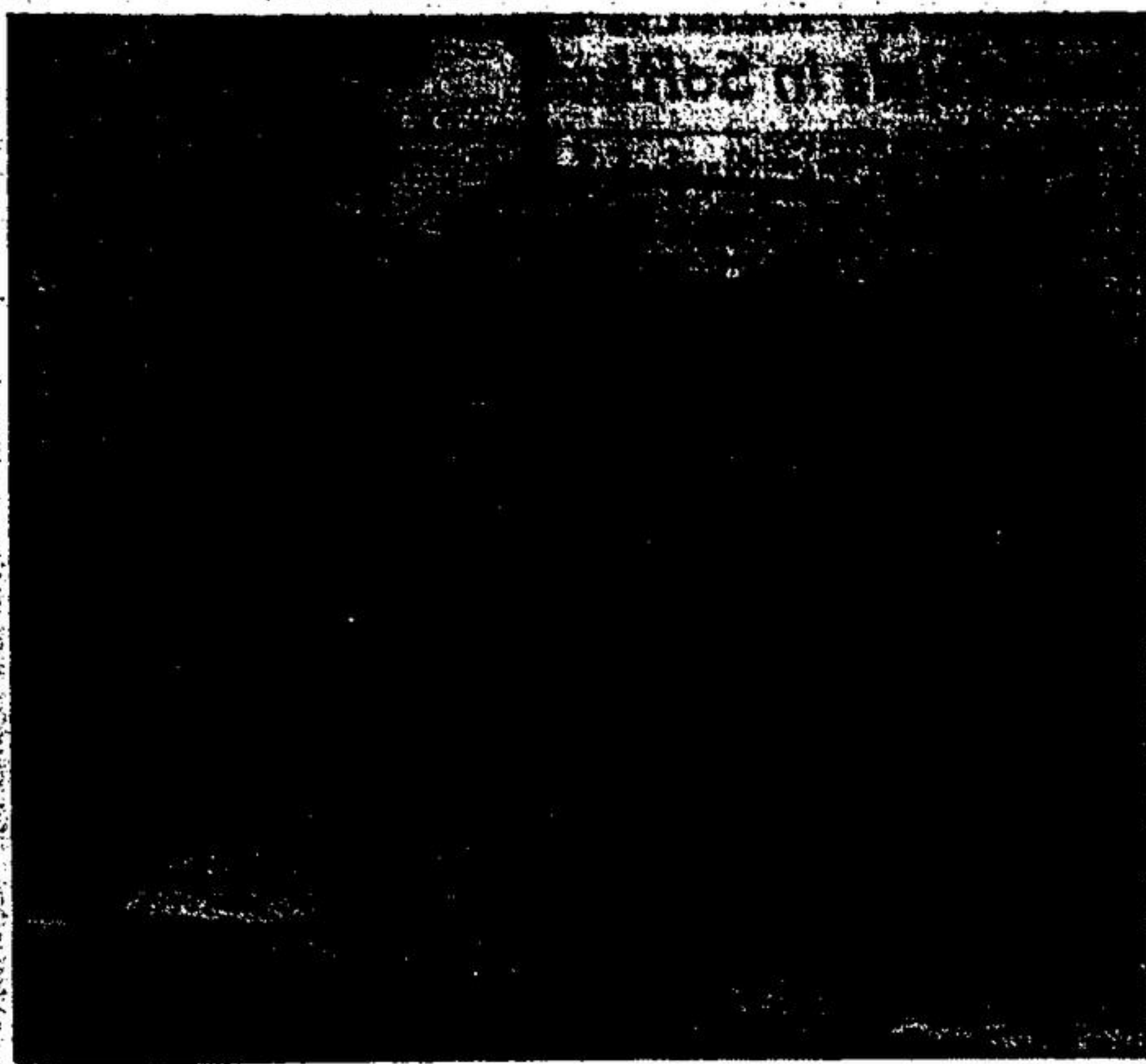


NORVAL LADIES' AID REUNION

Find No Solution For Kelso's Lamprey Problem

No answer has yet been found to Kelso Lake's lamprey eel problem, director Dave Murray of the Halton Region Conservation Authority said this week.

On the other hand, Mr. Murray added, no sign of the destructive eels has been seen so far this year in or near the north Halton beauty spot.

Lamprey eels, which wiped out a million dollar fishing industry in Lake Ontario, now pose a threat to the 17,500 speckled and rainbow trout with which Kelso Lake is stocked.

The eels, equipped with a sucker and a circle of incurved teeth, grow to a foot in length and are capable of attacking fish 30 times their own size.

"We found three dead trout in Kelso Lake last year," Mr. Murray said. "The biggest, which weighed 5 pounds 2 ounces, still had a lamprey stuck to it and there were two other circular marks on its side."

An attempt was made to preserve this fish, which at 24 inches was the largest trout the HRCRA has ever caught in Kelso Lake, but decomposition had gone too far.

Lampreys are lake denizens, but in spring they run up streams to spawn on gravel bottoms. Some are thought to have been trapped in Kelso

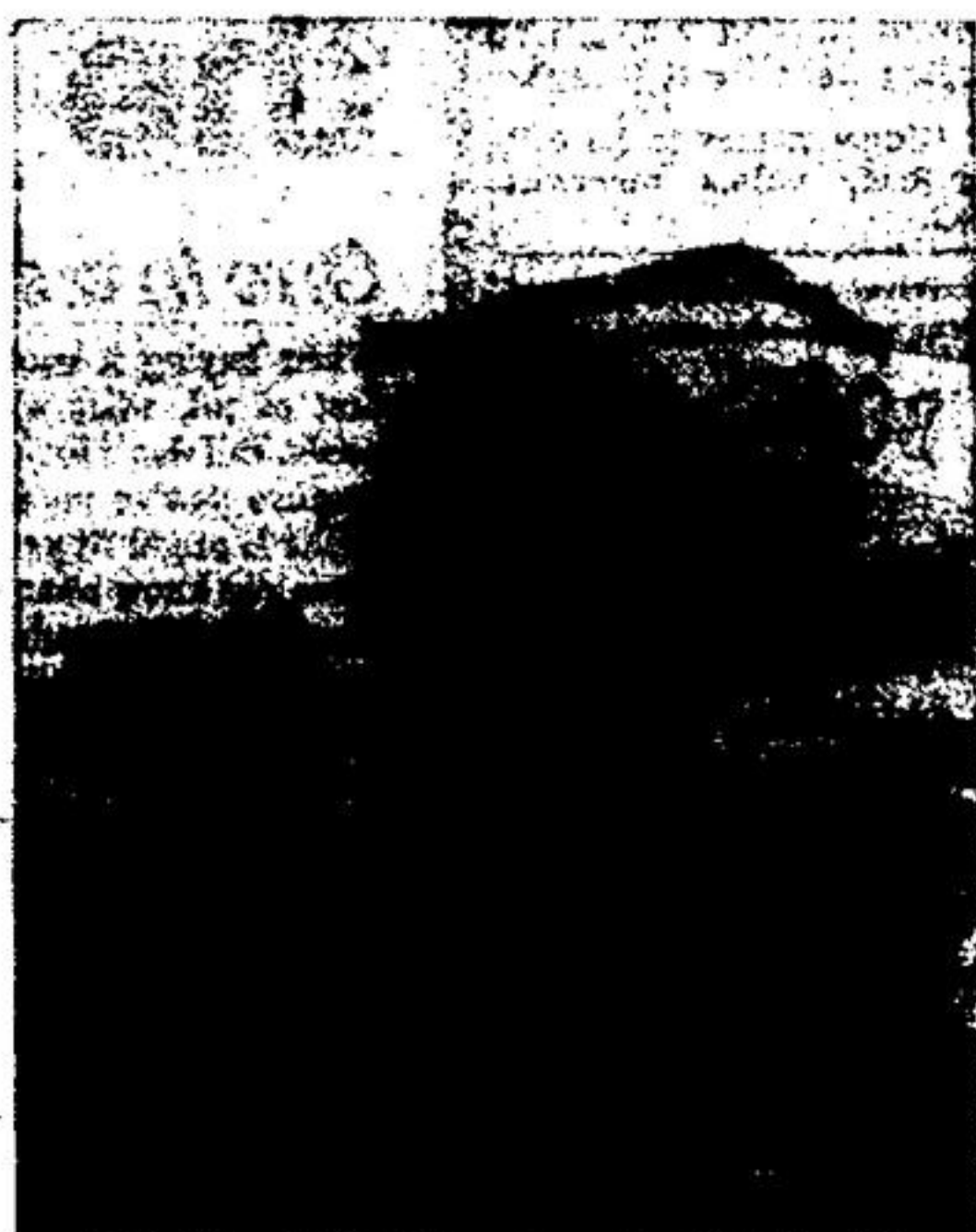

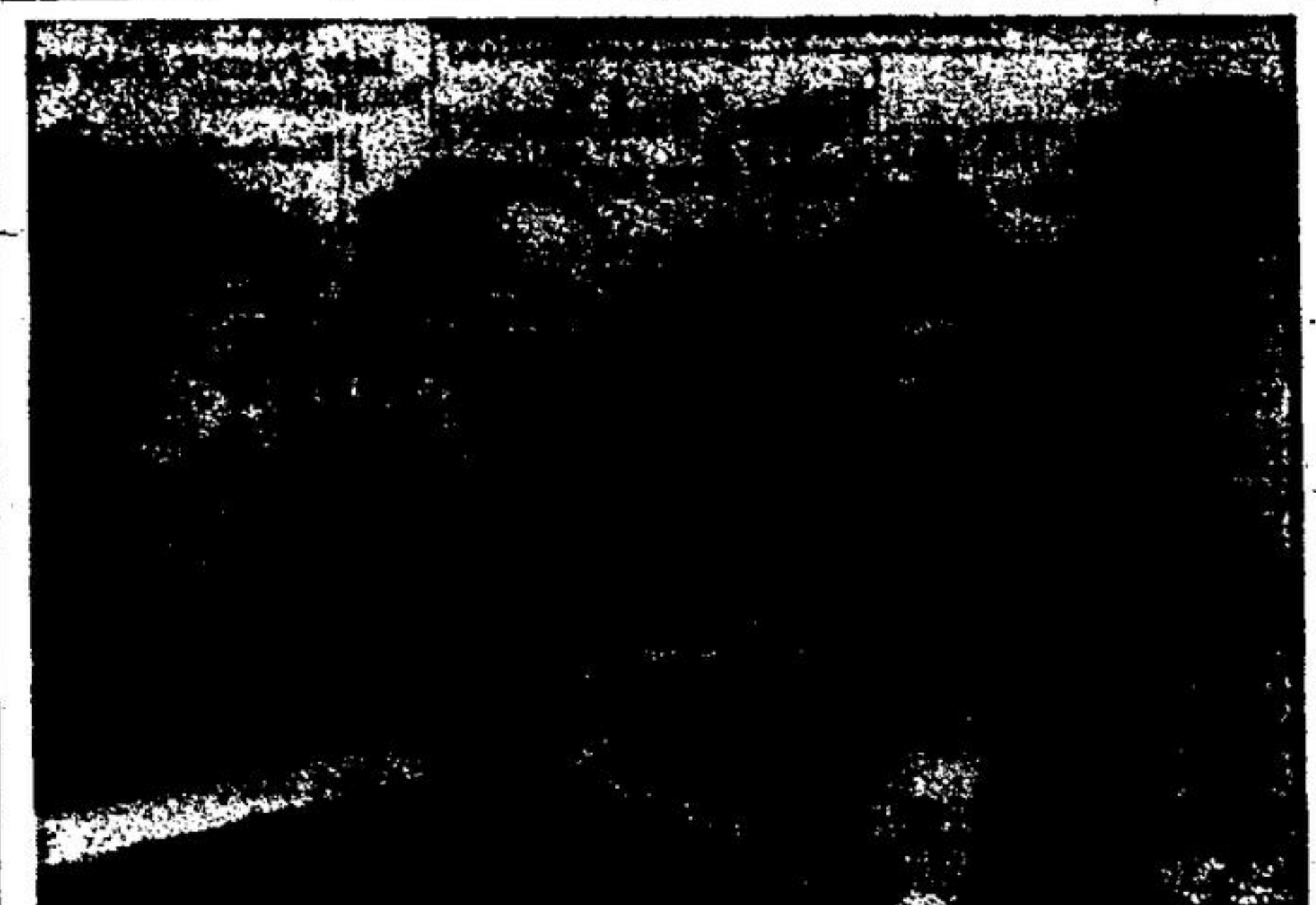
