Turn Down Request to Rename Some Glen Streets

A suggestion from the Post Office that streets in Glen Williams with the same names as streets in Georgetown, should have the names changed was rejected by Esqueusing council Monday night.

Clerk K.C. Lindsay pointed out that all the properties would have to be re-registered.

The clerk stated the houses could be numbered by August 1st, with the assessor doing this while on his rounds.

Cr. James Goodlet asked if it is the township's responsibility to put up street name signs, and was told it is. The individual householder is responsible for mail boxes.

C.F. Smallwood requested permission to operate a trailer camp from May till October. Mr. Smallwood has operated a picnic park at Fairy Lake for the past three years.

He told council he intended to instal flush washrooms to service approximately forty trailers. The Health Unit had already okayed the septic tank site he said.

The reeve stated that the by-law regarding trailer camps stated only certain areas, and this was not one of them.

In answer to a query from Cr. Jim Goodlet, Mr. Smallwood stated there would be no children going to school from there as it is only a summer operation, and week-ends during September and October.

"According to the by-law you can't have the trailer camp," commented Deputy Reeve Currie. "There are only two places where they are allowed and this isn't one of them."

Mr. Smallwood reminded council of the thousands of trailers at Expo and claimed they are the coming thing.

"The by-law says only Cedar Springs may have trailers," remarked Cr. Tom Hill. "What about the trailer camp at Norval?"

"It's cottages there," replied Cr. Pat Patterson.

"Do you drive past with one eye closed," retorted Cr. Hill.

It was decided to go over the by-law and give Mr. Smallwood an answer later.

Robert Herrington headed a five-man delegation protesting the narrow culvert at the bottom of a hill on Princess Street in Glen Williams.

"Sixty-eight trucks in three and a half hours used that road," he said. "There should not be heavy trucks on that road."

Another spectator Mrs. Dorothy Williams broke in saying, "We depend on those trucks for our living. I'm representing the business people."

"You're objecting to the narrow culvert," said the reeve to Mr. Herrington. "We can't stop the trucks using the road."

Road superintendent Bud Snow claimed the culvert could be widened but the kink could not be taken out of the road, because of a house sitting within four feet of the road.

Mr. Herrington then suggested a footpath.

It was decided to widen the culvert if possible.

After telling council of three head of cattle kept in a small building in the Glen, Deputy Reeve George Currie presented a motion to halt the keeping of cattle in the built up area of Glen Williams. "The smell in this hot weather is awful," remarked the deputy-reeve.

The motion passed together with another preventing parking on township roads at any time of the year. This one is aimed at trucks parking while construction is going on, said the deputy.

J. Gordon Nesbitt of Bowmanville was the driver of the car involved.

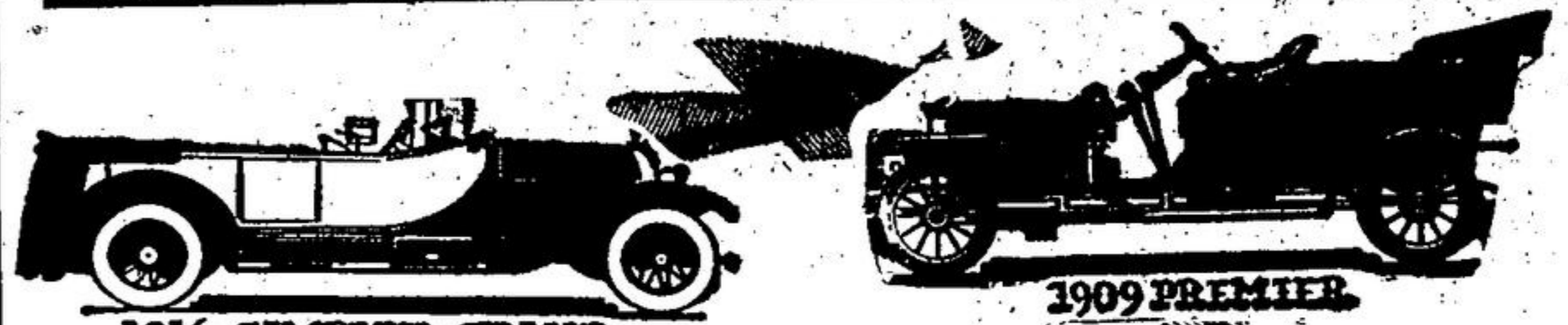
