The Georgetown Branch of the Canadian Red Cross Society will make another plea for warning signs and rescue equipment at strategic points along the Credit River if and when an inquest is held into the death of Gerald David and his wife Aldes. Mr. and Mrs. David and their unborn child died in the Credit below the River Dr. dam Tuesday, June 6 in a tragic drama that apparently no one witnessed.
