

5 Pound Speckled Trout Best Terra Cotta Catch

Fishermen's luck has been good in the fishing areas maintained by the Credit Valley Conservation Authority reports Superintendent Norm McMahon. Best catch yet this spring was that of Steven Petruck, 62 Queen St. S. Streetsville. He pulled in a five pound, 18 1/2 in. speckled trout while camping recently at Terra Cotta Conservation Area. No picture of the prize catch is available because Mr. Petruck was fishing for breakfast and he was hungry!

The Credit Valley Conservation Authority, with the co-operation of the Department of Lands and Forests, stocked the lakes at Terra Cotta and Credit River at Belfountain this spring. This is a yearly project of the Authority and makes for excellent fishing. Just before fishing season opened, 5,000 trout were led into the area lakes and the river.

Mr. McMahon reported that many two and three pound trout are being caught in the conservation areas.

Baseball Tips

17 Tips Handy For Outfielders

- This week I shall write about the duties of the outfielders and cutoffs and relays. Outfield play can be split into 17 tips.
1. Hustle every minute on the field.
 2. Back up every throw and base hit possible.
 3. Throw ball to right base at right time.
 4. Know how many outs there are and where tying and winning runs are.
 5. Have fixed in mind where to throw ball when you get it.
 6. Throw over hand and low on line to relay or cutoff man.
 7. Never drift on fly ball, dig and get to ball, making catch with feet in throwing position when possible.
 8. Beware of the direction wind is blowing and position of sun.
 9. Study hitters—know where they hit—also know your own pitcher; his speed and whether opposing hitters pull or hit late against him.
 10. Back-up all throws to bases and other outfielders.
 11. Never lag behind on ground balls charge, get set, look, make throw.
 12. Run on balls of feet to make smooth approach to ball.
 13. Field ball below belt hands down, above belt, hands up.
 14. Don't box ball; keep hands loose, let them give.
 15. Take all fly balls, rather than let infielder make tough play.
 16. Outfielders help each other—call for ball—yelling loudly and help by telling how much room there is on play near fences, also direct him where to make throw.
 17. Hustle on and off field at all times.

Bruce Trail's 450 Miles Officially Opened to Hikers

Saturday marked the official opening of the 450 mile wilderness path that cuts through the glitter and smog of modern Ontario and exposes 450 million years of natural history.

The Bruce Trail, a winding footpath running from Queenston Heights, near Niagara Falls, to Tobermory at the very tip of the Bruce Peninsula is the result of a seven year dream of Hamilton metallurgist Ray Lowes.

More than 500 people have worked on the project, trying to find possible routes for the trail which lies for the most part on private property. The land owners have given permission for hikers to use the path.

In the Collingwood area the trail reaches a maximum height of 1,775 in the Blue Mountains.

The Bruce Peninsula itself provides a rugged setting where the edge of the escarpment borders on the breakers of Georgian Bay, hundreds of feet below.
