Wash Truck Wheels Memo to Contractors
In an effort to keep roads free of mud and dust where new construction is underway, council Monday night instructed Wimpey Homes and Brumac Developments that water outlets must be installed at the outer edge of the construction area, where truck wheels will be washed before going on town roads.

Cr. Bill Smith confessed he knew no other way to control the mud and dust.

Cr. Robert Francis said the Monday night council hired Raymond Mills to read water meters while Mr. Whitmee is on vacation.

They also hired Walter Pacholok as building inspector and zoning administrator.

They accepted the tender of J.C. Cunningham for \$90 to build a cupboard in the police office.

They were notified by the Georgetown public school board that Ernest Bodnar had been appointed to the High school board as their representative, to replace William Carr who resigned.

Council issued a cheque in the amount of \$125,000 to the Georgetown Public School board for current expenses.

They granted permission to Halton's Pride Loyal Tree Blue and Orange Lodge to hold a tag day, July 14 and 15. Proceeds to go to the home at Richmond Hill.

They decided the salary of the clerk C.G. Benham, will be \$7,000 annually retroactive to January 1967.

Authorized the advertising for tenders for a one ton pickup truck, for the Water department.

Authorized the erection of a stop sign at the north west corner of Weber Drive and Delrex Blvd East.

The Georgetown District High School Board requested council to issue debentures in the amount of \$50,000 to cover; the acquisition of the Tost property fixing the playing field site, and finishing the present project. Council will ask for Ontario Municipal Board approval and arrange for temporary financing.
