Expect 56 Suite Apartment Building Ready in August

Centennial Court, the apartment building under construction at Guelph and Maple Ave., has half the fifty-six suites rented at present.

The first of August will see the first tenants move into the one and two bedroom suites. The one bedrooms range in rate from \$120 to \$130, and the two bedroom apartments, from \$130 to \$140.

All are equipped with refrigerators, stoves, TV outlets, piped in music, which you can turn off at will, and intercoms to the front hall.

There are elevators, and laundry rooms in the four story building, which will have mail delivery to each individual suite.

The halls are pressurized keeping fumes from travelling through the building, and causing a rush of fresh air when the apartment door opens.

There is parking space for 70 cars, at 2 1/2 cents per hour.
