

No-Hit Pitching Fails As Giants Still Win

Sometimes pitching a no-hitter doesn't insure a victory — especially if you pitch for Watford Tigers.

That's what happened to Neil Dodman, Wednesday night in Georgetown park. The young hurler held the Giants hitless but lost a 2-1 decision to the locals in a Halton Intermediate League ball game.

Only shortstop Dan Arbie and catcher Don Lindsay were able to loft fly balls out of the infield and Dodman didn't need any fielding help to preserve his game. He walked six and fanned nine.

Dodman lost a 1-0 lead in the third inning when Jim James walked, went to second and advanced to third on a passed ball and scored as Arbie's grounder went through second baseman Doug Jesson's legs.

In the fifth, winning pitcher Jim McGill walked, went to second and fielder's choice, to

Waterdown had taken a 1-0 lead in the first inning on singles by Larry King, Laurie Williams and Doug Lane.

BASEBALL TIPS

Examples of Cut-off And Relay Ball Plays

Man on Base and sure Double

(a) Ball to leftfield corner. 3rd baseman goes to third base and calls the play for shortstop 'home', 'third', 'second' or 'no play' as situation develops. Second baseman goes to second base, first baseman to cutoff position along third baseline. Pitcher backs up home plate, right and centerfielders alert to cover second.

(b) Ball to rightfield corner. Third baseman to third base, second and first basemen to rightfield line with best arm in relay position for play at plate and other player as 'safety valve' or play caller. Shortstop to second base and then to cutoff position as sure double develops. Pitcher backs up home but if no play there backs up third. Leftfielder alert to back up third. On throw to plate where runner is safe, catcher should go out to meet ball for possible play at third base.

Man on base and single to Outfield

(a) Ball to left field. Shortstop lines up throw. Second baseman goes to second. Outfielder must give shortstop firm throw, easy to handle. When shortstop and third baseman make effort for ground ball between them, they switch

positions with third baseman taking cutoff position.

(b) Ball to centerfield. Shortstop and second basemen call play, with one going out for cutoff and other to second base.

(c) Ball to rightfield. Second baseman lines up throw and shortstop goes to second base. Outfielder must give second baseman firm throw, easy to handle. When first baseman and second baseman make effort for ground ball between them they must switch positions with first baseman taking cutoff position.

No one on base and sure double

(a) Ball to leftfield corner. Third baseman goes to third base, shortstop to leftfield line in relay position for play at third base. Second baseman goes to bag, drifts toward shortstop position as sure double develops. First baseman trails runner to second base. Pitcher backs up third base.

(b) Ball to rightfield corner. Third baseman goes to third base, shortstop to second and then drifts to cutoff position as sure double develops. First and second basemen take relay position for possible play at third base, the best arm in relay position. Pitcher backs up third base.

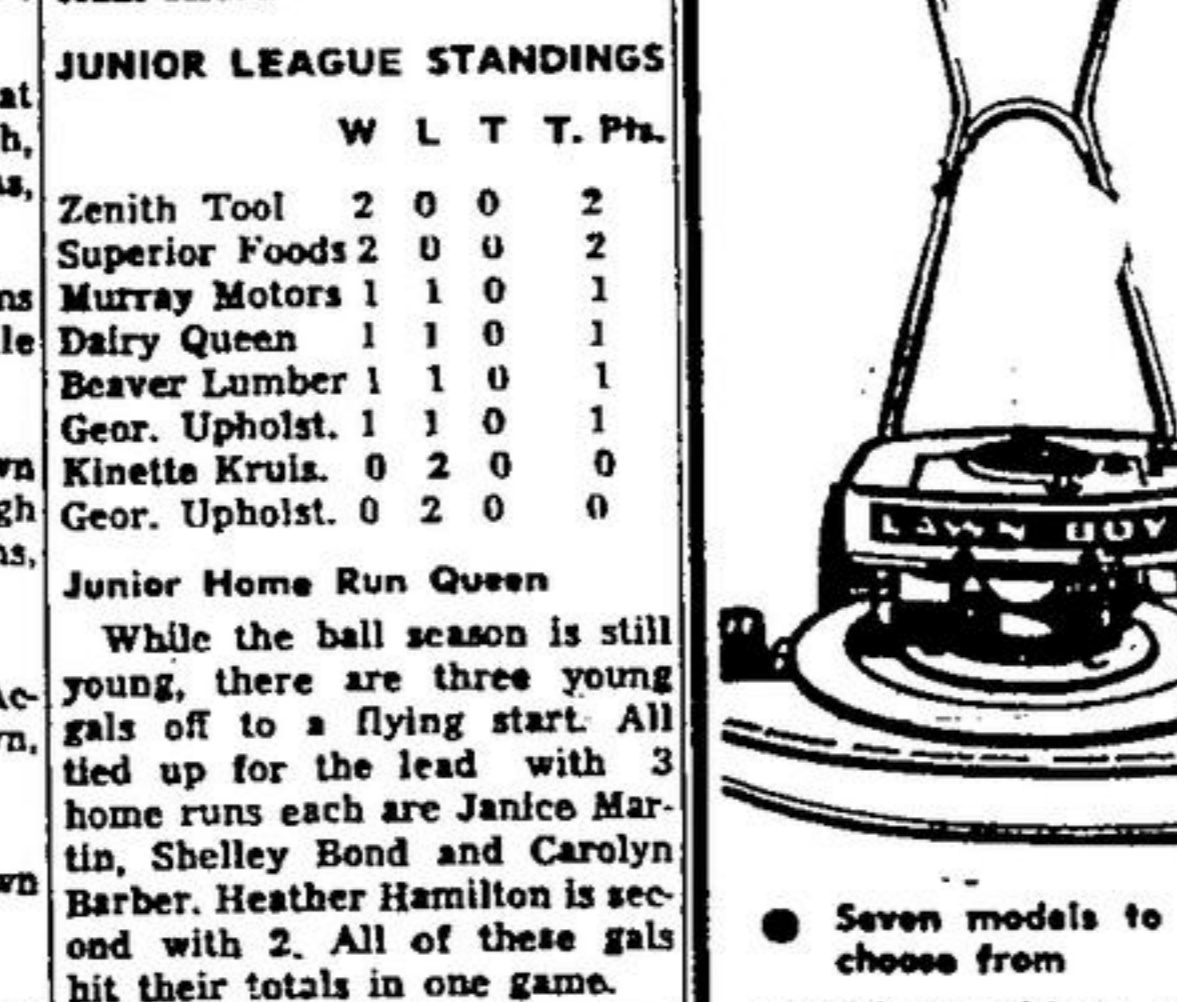
The smiling coach at the end of this squeaker was George Bowen.

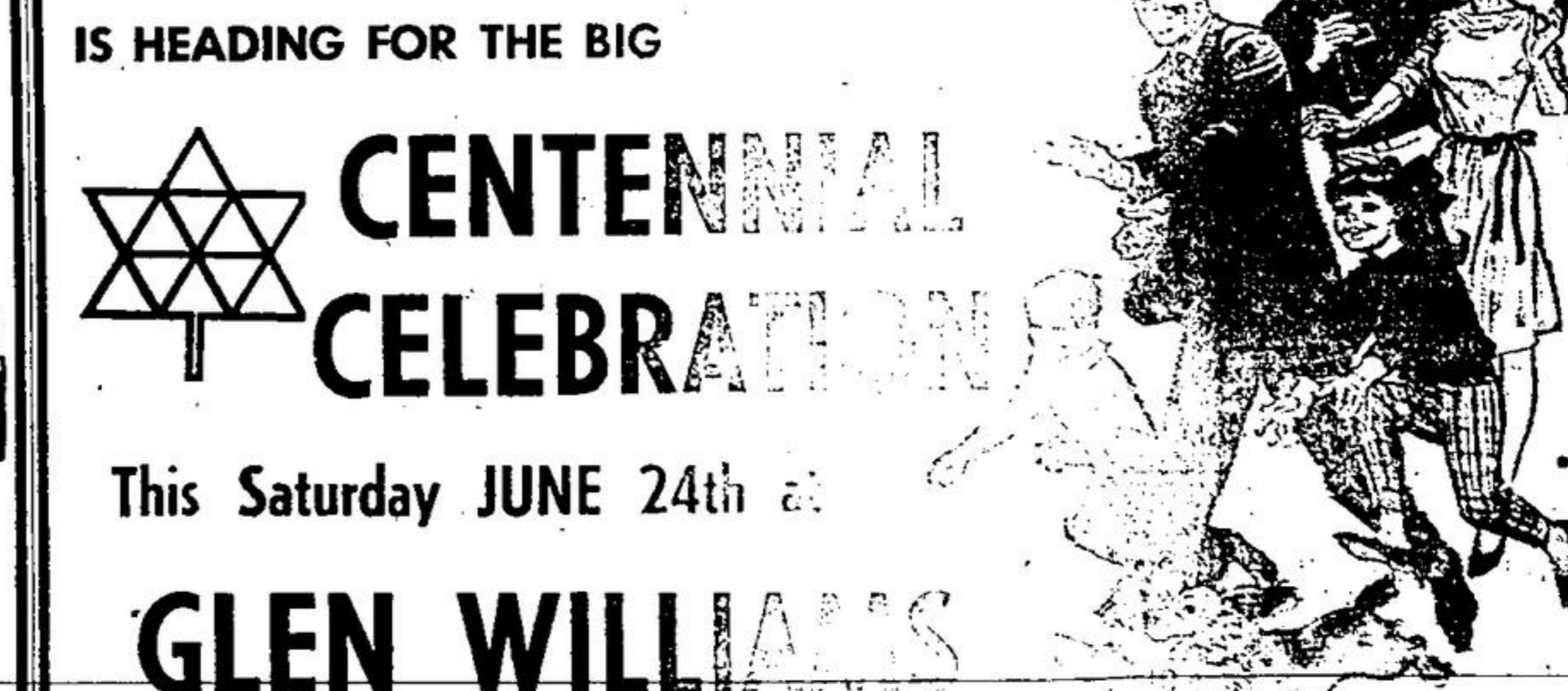
