A contract for reconstruction of the road from Huttonville to Armstrong, Bros. Construction Co. Ltd. and work is expected to be started by July 1st. Completion date is approximately 2 1/2 months. Contract price is \$333,836.40. Contract includes the reconstruction of the road to a point just east of the intersection at the top of the Huttonville hill. This intersection is to be improved and realigned next year.
