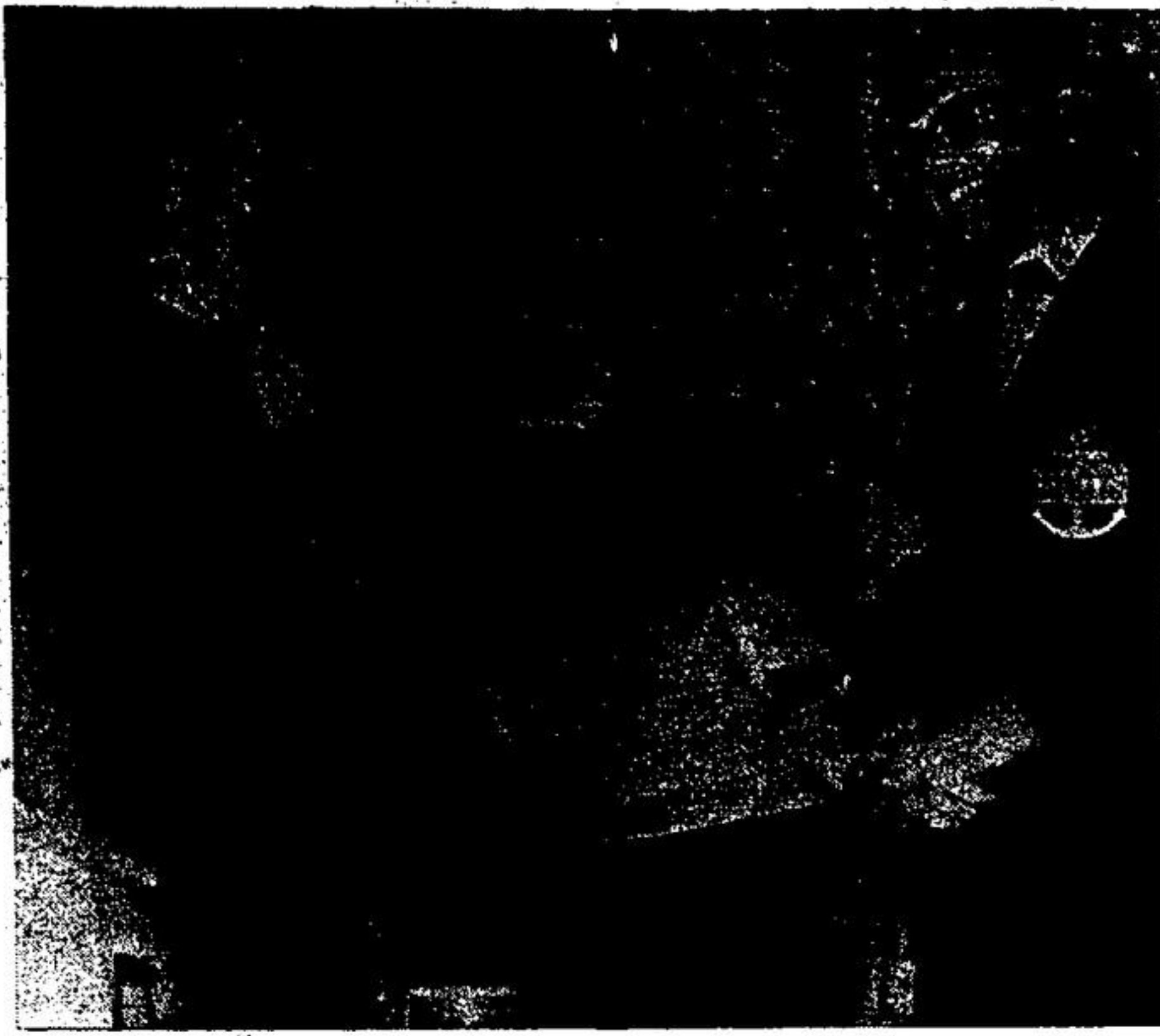


**CHARTER FOR TEMPLAR ROVER CREW**

**Rain, Warm Weather Aids County Crops After Drought**

During past week between 3 and 4 inches of rain has fallen in Halton county. This rain was a normal crop of hay and grains desparately needed to insure. With the cool and damp weather earlier this spring, the seedling of spring grains was greatly delayed. Soils were difficult to work, and extra cultivation were required to prepare the seed bed.

Just two inches of rain fell in May, and combined with the extra cultivation of the fields soils dried out very rapidly. Rainfall during the past week combined with our warm temperatures will give maximum growth of both crop and weeds.

Farmers who have not yet sprayed their corn with Atrazine should do so immediately. Weeds are growing very rapidly and just a few days' delay can mean the difference between a good and poor control. 1 1/2 gallons of light mineral oil should be used in combination with the Atrazine on emerged weeds.

Farmers growing corn on our heavy clay soils might be well advised to cultivate their corn fields as soon as they are dry enough. The large amount of rain has compacted the soil surface, and is not permitting the correct balance between air, soil and water for maximum growth. A shallow cultivation of not more than two inches can let in oxygen and help restore the correct balance. Cultivations trials on heavy clay soils following the heavy June rains last year gave some increases on corn.

Winter killing occurred on some of the poorer drained hay and pasture fields this spring although not as serious as in the spring of 1966. Growth up until recently has been considerably below normal but is now accelerating. Farmers who find that they are short of hay following the first cut, should consider fertilizing their fields for a higher yield in the second cut.

**Harley Wants Ambulance Fees Paid by Government**

(Special to the Herald) — Halton MP Dr. Harry Harley has again placed a private member's notice of motion on the Commons' order paper dealing with ambulances.

A similar motion was on the order paper in the last session of parliament but no action was taken by the government.

The motion asks the government to give consideration to the advisability of amending the Hospital Insurance and Diagnostic Services Act to provide for payment for emergency ambulance services. The motion recognizes that the consent of the provincial governments would be required to make the change effective.

The Halton MP has expressed concern for several years that unless some steps are taken to assure payment to ambulances for emergency calls that many ambulance services will refuse to answer such calls because of a record of being unable to collect the fees for their services.
