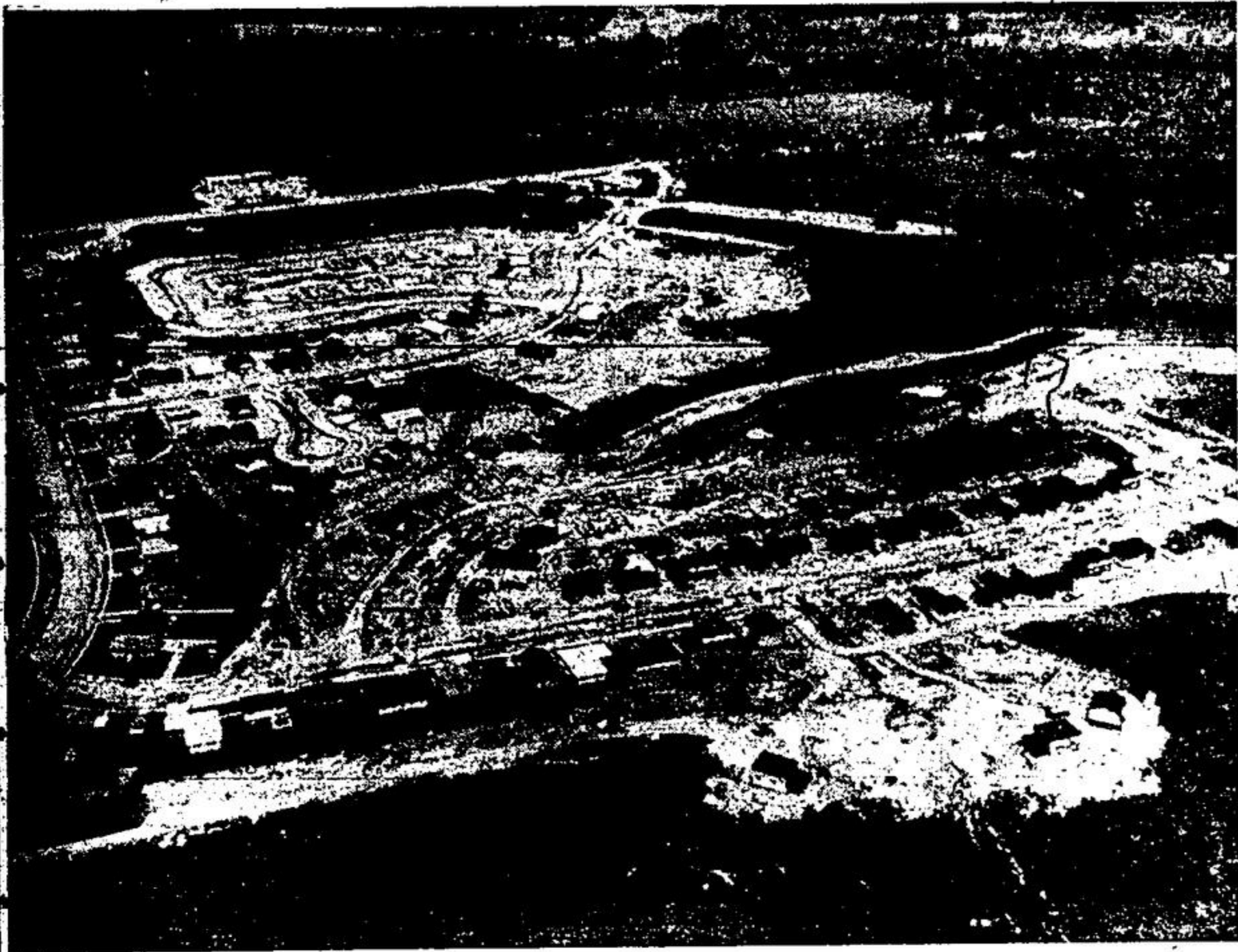


**BOOM GOES HOUSE CONSTRUCTION**
