Wants Halton, Peel in One Large Health Unit

Halton county council has been advised to hire a new medical officer of health as soon as possible, despite an anticipated request from Peel board of health for discussions on amalgamation.

Provincial subsidies will be increased from 50 per cent to 75 per cent of unit expenditure.

Dr. Archer Bull, provincial health departments representative, and director of the central region of Ontario, has told Halton board of health that Peel will soon make its amalgamation bid.

Dr. Bull, former MOH in Halton, told the board his department reckoned a unit should deal with a population of at least 150,000 and that larger districts — up to 300,000 could be administered more efficiently.

He said it was suggested that units should be directed into districts, each to be directed by a MOH and a business administrator.
