Action Promised to End Problem of Sewer Back-up

Action to end sanitary sewer backups in the Sunbeam Heights area was promised Monday by Cr. Fred Harrison.

Council heard a complaint from Charles Jenner, Shelley St. about continuing trouble, the last on Wednesday night during a heavy rain.

A letter from Mrs. S. Heywood, 2 Gray Gate, recited similar trouble.

Cr. Harrison said an engineering firm has been asked to check the area and recommend a solution.

Meanwhile a drive will be made to have roof drains which have been hooked into the sanitary sewers removed. Much of the trouble council believes, is caused by excess water enter-

ing the sewers which were not designed for this purpose.

"A number of homes in this area have downspouts into the ground and no one knows where the water is going" said Cr. Bill Smith. "Even if they do go into the ground, there should be an extension to take water away from the house, so it doesn't find its way into the sewers."

Cr. Harrison said it could easily be ascertained where drainage is going if colouring matter was added.

"I've been trying for six years to find where the run-off from the high school roof goes" he said. "I think it goes into the main trunk sewer, but I'd like to be proved wrong."

Reeve Hunter said council had decided to make it illegal to hook roof drains into sewers but no by-law has yet been drawn up.

Deputy Reeve Speight said work to overcome the problem will be underway the first week in July.

Appoint Judges for Historical Contest

The library centennial project of collecting as many historical anecdotes and facts, as possible about the town and surrounding district has progressed to the appointing of judges by the library Board. David Meakin head of the history department at the high school, Ben Case member of the Halton County Museum Board, and Anne Currie, Herald reporter, have been asked to act as judges.

The Library Board is offering prizes ranging from five dollars to fifty dollars for stories so that a human history capturing the atmosphere of the town and reminiscences of the town, rather than a statistical history, can be collected.

The Board urges all the older residents to write down some of these tales you have heard for years, otherwise they will be lost forever.
