

Senior School Now, So Can't Declare Champions

For the first time in ten years Georgetown is without a track and field championship public school.

No championship school was declared at the 1967 track and field inter-school meet in Georgetown park Thursday because the system now includes a senior public school, Centennial, with only grades 7 and 8, and two junior public schools, George Kennedy and Harrison, with only Kindergarten to Grade six.

Rate Arbie as Top Pro Ball Prospect

A first baseman, a shortstop and a pitcher rate as the best professional baseball prospects on the basis of their early season performance in the Halton County League.

The shortstop is Danny Arbie, at 19 in his third season with the Georgetown Giants. Arbie is second in the league batting race with a .414 average.

Bookie Will Phillips of the Watford Tigers is the first baseman. He is fourth in the batting race with a .387 average.

The pitcher is Dan Cholewka, a second year man with the Burlington Cardinals. Cholewka has a brilliant 0.42 earned run average and has struck out 36 batters in just 21 and one-third innings.

Veteran left-hander Jack Roberts of the Campbellville Merchants has joined Cholewka, Terry Litzen of Dundas and Ross Ingalls of Burlington in a duel for the pitching lead.

Roberts, inactive earlier this year because of a shoulder injury, is now in third place with a 0.87 ERA.

Litzen is still in second place with a 0.46 record and Ingalls 4th with 0.66.

Harry Escalbin of Campbellville leads in most other pitching departments, including strikeouts (41), and walks (30).

Shortstop-pitcher Larry Wilson of the Dundas Chiefs remains the league's leading batter with a .519 average. Arbie and Ron Phillips of Milton (400) are the league's other 400 hitters.

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Arrange Swimming Classes For Pre-Schoolers at Pool

Pre-school tots, some of them as young as three years old will be swimming in Georgetown Community Swimming Pool this summer. Betty-Lou Bowden, the community pool supervisor and chief instructor announced this week that classes for the very small will start Monday, July 3 and run five days a week for the duration of the month.

It's the first time that a pre-school instruction program has been offered at the pool. Up until now the minimum age limit was six years.

Because of the size of pupils Mrs. Bowden will use a teaching ratio of one instructor for every five pupils which limits the enrollment to 40. Registration is at the pool tomorrow night (Friday) from 6:30 to 8 o'clock.

Pupils must be at least 30 inches tall and between three and five years of age.

"These kiddies often catch on faster than the Beginners class, because they develop a sense of security faster," said Mrs. Bowden who for four seasons specialized in teaching pre-schoolers to swim at North York.

"Most of them are able to do some swimming on their own at the end of the first week," she said.

One year old Tammy Bowden is a pre-schooler with a head start. Being the daughter of a swimming instructor she is about ready now to stroke out on her own.

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Juveniles Win, Lose In Two Close Games

However, Georgetown started to whittle away at the score by bringing a run across in the third when Whitham was hit by the pitcher, a single by Robinson, Quackenbush also being hit by the pitcher and Peavoy's walk accounted for the run.

They scored another in the fourth when Schultz slashed a drive past the shortstop and Ray Ingalls up from the midgets tripled him home. Georgetown opened the fifth trailing 5-2 when Peavoy walked, Bill Dwyer singled, and Schultz doubled Peavoy home. Joel Tost walked to load the bases and Ray Ingalls grounded out to first to score another. Dwyer grounded out to second to score, Schultz with the tying run. Georgetown put the icing on the cake in the 6th with three more runs when Peavoy walked, Schultz singled and Peavoy scored when Tost's grounder was booted by third baseman.

Ray Ingalls doubled to score the final two runs.

Campbellville tried vainly in the 7th with 2 runs but still came out the loser 8-7. The juveniles play the Juniors at the park on Thursday night, then host Bramalea on Tuesday night and travel to Milton on Wednesday.
