

Too Much Rain Brings Harm to Halton Crops

Heavy rainfall in the past two weeks has hit Halton county's grain crops badly — right at the beginning of the harvest season.

The flat, heavy clay fields of south Halton are worst affected because of poor drainage, according to Henry Stanley, Halton's agricultural representative.

"The water-logged soil does not have the proper balance of air, water and soil for good growth," he said this week.

"Lack of air in the soil and poor uptake of nitrogen is causing yellowing of oats, barley and corn crops in these low areas."

Mr. Stanley said last week's hot weather caused the leaves of the weakened crops to wither at the tips and turn brown.

"Little can be done to remedy this at the present," he added.

He suggests the digging of surface drains to remove water lying on fields. "If properly placed, these can greatly assist in removing excessive water," Mr. Stanley said.
