## Find Missing Teener North Halton Police

The North Halton detachment of the Ontario Provincial Police investigated 63 general occurrences during the past week, including three break, enter and theft investigations, one break and enter where no property was stolen, two fraud investigations, one person charged with impaired driving, two minor thefts resulting in one person being charged, seven liquor investigations resulting in six persons being charged under the Liquor Control Act, one stolen auto recovered for another police department, one missing person, a 15 year old located for Belleville Police Dept., and one premise found in secure as well as other minor occurrences.

During the week detachment personnel worked a total of 835 hours and patrolled a total of 7,185 miles on area highways. As a result of patrol, 25 traffic violation charges were preferred, 33 traffic violation warnings were issued, and 76 vehicles were safely checked. There were 20 convictions registered.

## BOATING TIPS

Nearly 10 per cent of last year's drownings in Canada involved power boats. To help curb these needless fatalities, the Red Cross has sent along these ten boating safety tips for motor boat owners.

- 1) Know and operate your craft well.
- 2) Know and obey the rules of the road.
- 3) Equip your boat with government approved safety equipment.

Use the correct tie-up technique to lay our heads and cook our meals and make lunches and burn holes in the chestfield and have all OUR relatives in. Just something like home.

We wouldn't stay all summer you know. Kim has to be home Sundays to play the organ at church. And Hugh has to be home every two weeks to have his finger re-broken, reset, re-encased in a cast. (I think he's found his life's work.)

- 4) Carry and use the correct lights at night.
- 5) Don't overload the boat.
- 6) Use the recommended horsepower for the size of the boat.
- 7) Never smoke while refueling.
- 8) Check and heed weather reports before setting out.
- 9) Wear a life jacket in choppy waters and at night.
- 10) If upset, call for help and hang on to the boat until help arrives unless the boat is drifting into danger or the water is extremely cold.
