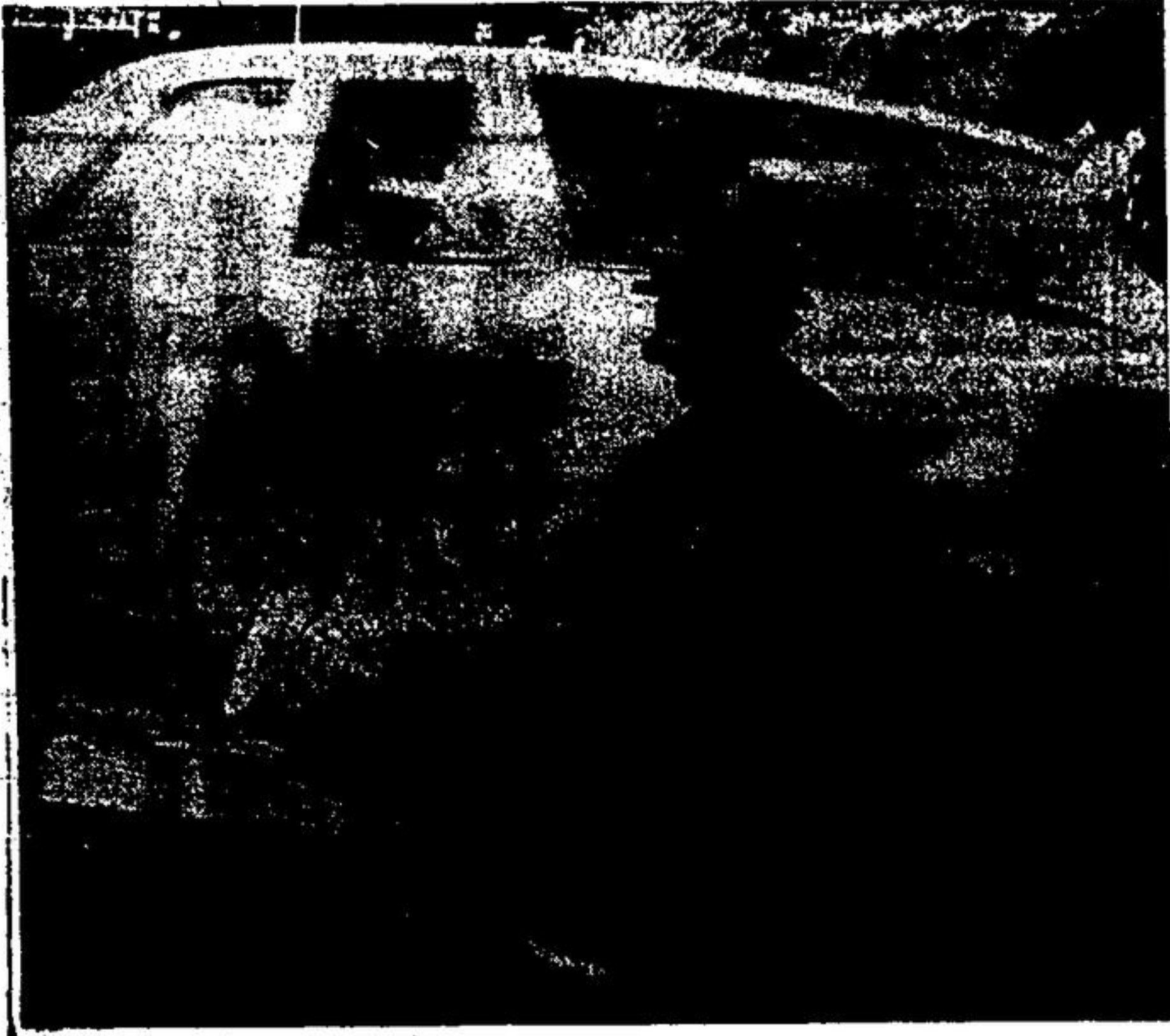


DEATH JUST A WHISKER AWAY

OBEY THESE WATER SAFETY RULES Don't Let Your Summer Fun Turn To Tragedy

(A safety message from the Georgetown Branch of the Canadian Red Cross)

1. Swim in SUPERVISED areas.
 2. Swim parallel to the shore if swimming a long distance.
 3. Inner tubes and air mattresses are dangerous.
 4. Swim and wade only in known water.
 5. Cool off before swimming.
 6. Swim when rested.
 7. Dive only into deep water which has been marked.
 8. Always swim with a buddy.
 9. A boat must contain one life-jacket for everyone.
 10. Non-swimmers must wear life-jackets when in a boat.
 11. For safety and enjoyment swim in water between 68-75 degrees F.
 12. Lifeguards are responsible for your safety—obey them!
 13. If your boat or canoe capsizes—HANG ON!
 14. An overloaded boat is like a fish-bone with a weight in its throat!
 15. Boating and drinking DON'T mix.
 16. Plastic wading pools can be deathtraps for children. "SUPERVISE THEM".
 17. Panic causes many drownings. Try to remain calm. "THINK, DON'T SINK".
 18. Avoid horseplay both in the water and in a boat. Playfulness may cost a life.
 19. Swimming after dark is very dangerous.
 20. Keep REACHING AIDS handy near all potential dangerous water areas.
 21. REMEMBER — a person can drown in 2" of water.
- Small children in, on and around the water should wear Government approved life jackets.
