HARLEY TO HALTON
Weekly Observations by Dr. Harry Harley, M.P. for Halton



THE HOUSE of Commons continues its studies on estimates of Government spending.

AS HALTON borders Lake Ontario, I thought it would be of interest to write of the proposed Canada Centre for Inland Waters on Pier 29 at Burlington. An estimate of the cost of site development and construction of buildings is approximately 17 million dollars phased over a three year period with a probable extension to five years. This Centre at Burlington is the major scientific establishment for water research for the Federal Government.

AMONG THE most critical problems facing Canada today in the field of resources is the pollution of the waters of the Great Lakes and of resources in the Great Lakes and of other lakes, rivers and streams in areas of population and industrial development. The growing public demand for effective action by all levels of government is a matter of common knowledge. This demand can be met at this time by the Federal Government establishing a centre for applied and basic scientific and engineering research with related planning, economic

SILVER'S SALUTES Sir John A. Macdonald



He was the chief architect of Confederation — though he always said he'd rather abolish the provinces than federate them. The resolutions of the Quebec Conference — and the 1867 British North America Act — were almost entirely in his wording.

Dominating Canadian politics for the first 24 years after Confederation — 19 of them as Prime Minister — Macdonald set the pattern for the way in which the new country would be run.

Glasgow born, Macdonald was raised at Kingston on the Upper Canadian frontier. He entered politics as a young lawyer in the 1840s, soon emerging as Leader of the Upper Canadian Conservatives. With his Lower Canadian counterpart, George Cartier, he headed the government of the united colony of Upper and Lower Canada in 1858 when Confederation was first seriously proposed.

It wasn't till six years later that Macdonald acted. The delay was typical of tactics that earned him the nickname of "Old Tomorrow." His enemies called it procrastination; in fact, it was a brilliant sense of timing. Macdonald was patient enough to wait for the right moment, and when it came, he knew how to act quickly.

The 1864 Charlottetown Conference on Union of the Maritime Provinces gave him the chance he needed. His self-invited Canadian delegation swept through Charlottetown like a whirlwind, knocking the Maritimers off their feet with the plan for a British North American Confederation, and driving Maritime Union forever into the background.

In less than two months Macdonald succeeded in getting the Maritimers to accept the idea of Confederation, come to Quebec for a second conference, and approve a draft constitution for the new state.
