**Nurse, Bull Jerseys
Are Gold Medal Sires**
The Jersey bull, Brampton Fifth Line Marvel, Vary Good has just been designed a Silver Medal bull by the Canadian Jersey Cattle Club on the high production of his daughters. His 18 tested daughters have an average production m.e. of -10, -164 lbs. milk, 528 lbs fat, 5.20 per cent, and 18 classified average 84.00%.

This bull was bred by B. H. Bull and Son, Norval and used by Fundy Jersey Farm, Truro N. S. His sire, Brampton Marvel Excellent, Silver and Gold Medal Superior Sire has 17 daughters that average 10,858 lbs. milk, 567 lbs. fat, 5.22 per cent with 18 classified 86.34 per cent. His dam, Brampton Fifth Line, Excellent, Ton of Gold cow, is also dam of the famous bull, Brampton Sixth Generation. She has 2 Silver, 5 Gold, and 3 Medals of Merit. At 8 years she produced in 305 days (6x), 15,967 lbs. milk, 808 lbs. fat 5.80 per cent.

As well as startlingly wayward bees, the ocean of blossom is a source of amusement for visitors to the Inson Nursery property on the Check Line just west of town. Above, one of the young visitors stoops to breathe in the fragrance. Oops! Watch out for that bee. The one with the big satisfied grin.

Worse Than Hurricane Hazel Rainfall is Ruining Local Crops

Heavy June rainfalls have caused "quite a bit of damage" in Halton, according to John Cockburn of the Ontario Department of Agriculture.

"In the past three weeks we have had as much rain as we got in Hurricane Hazel," he said.

"Of course, we don't have the flooding problem but all that water is in the ground."

Certain crops have been hit harder than others, Mr. Cockburn said.

Hay, which reaches a peak in early June is still in the fields at many farms. There have been two problems, Mr. Cockburn said. Those farmers who did not get a chance to harvest their hay in early June have found it too wet to take mowers into the fields.

Those who have been able to get their hay cut and baled have not been able to gather it, be-

cause it has not had a chance to dry out. The hay declines in quality about four or five per cent a week after it reaches this peak, Mr. Cockburn said.

Some early spring grains — such as oats and barley — have also been adversely affected by the rain, especially around Hornby.

The grain is stunted and yellowed, Mr. Cockburn said because there has been so much water in the soil that the crops have not been able to get sufficient air.

Below Quality

Some fruit and vegetables are also going to be below quality this year because of the rain. Many farmers have been unable to spray because the ground has been so soft, and those trees and plants that do get sprayed are washed clean of insecticides by the rain.

Mr. Cockburn said that the

rainfall has been heavier east of here. Even within the county he said, there has been more rain on the eastern portion than on the west side.

Harry Droogendyk and Russ Oldham are both marketers in the Huttonville area who have escaped serious damage. "The land is high and sandy, and it drains very well" said Mr. Oldham who works for Leonard Butt Bulbs.

He said, however, that some of the strawberries are rotting on the vine, while they are still green.

Lorne Collins, who runs a farm in Huttonville with his father, said this has been the worst spring that he can remember. "The ground is so saturated with water, it is simply killing the root systems," he said.

The Collins' main product is spinach which is sold to whole-

salers in Toronto.

"We may be all right if the rain stops," he continued. "Spinach is an eight-week crop, and we already have other seedlings ready for planting."

Mr. Collins was farming in the Etobicoke area when Hurricane Hazel struck, but says this year is worse.

"Hurricane Hazel did all the damage in three days while we have had rain for three or four weeks," he said.
