## Co-Piloted Light Plane In Coast to Coast Air Race

Barbara Brotherton, wife of Economy Forms Georgetown plant manager Thomas Brotherton, is an entrant in the 21st annual All-Woman Transcontinental Air Race for light planes which started Saturday, from Atlantic City, New Jersey.

She is one of nearly 200 women pilots and co-pilots who will be racing for coveted Powder Puff Derby trophies and \$3,000 in prize money in the longest and largest speed race in the world for light planes.

Mrs. Brotherton, who has 310 total flying hours began flying in 1958. She, her husband, who is also a pilot, and their two

children live at RR 1, Limehouse.

Mrs. Brotherton will be in a Piper 28 co-piloting with Mrs. Ruth C. Bliss of Chappaqua, New York.

They took off from Atlantic City, July 8 and finished by sunset July 11 at Torrance, California.

The race is sponsored by the Ninety-nines Inc., an international organization of licensed women pilots with a membership of 2,700 representing 23 different countries.

The group was founded by Amelia Earheart in 1929 to promote aviation in general

and women pilots in particular.

Since its beginning in 1947 when a handful of planes raced from Palm Springs, California, to Miami, Florida, the event has grown each year in popularity. Approximately 100 planes have been entered this year.

In the interest of safety the race is held during daylight hours only and all planes must land at designated cross-country stops by sundown each night.
