

Three Injuries in Week's Auto Accidents

Five year old Douglas Watson became the third person injured in a local accident this month when he ran into the side of a car on Ewing Street, Wednesday, July 5.

Police said the child ran from the west side of the street into the side of a car operated by Gerald H. McIlale of 38 Sargent Road at about 4:50 p.m. He was treated for abrasions to his knee and forehead.

The day before, Richard Blackwell age 18, of 38 McIntyre Cres., suffered a broken

nose when the car he was operating was in collision with a late model car operated by Marjorie J. Pomeroy of Norval at the corner of Guelph St. and Rexway Drive. Property damage in that one was estimated at \$900 by police.

The first personal injury accident this month occurred July 3 at the same corner where a car operated by Sheldon Walter Lawr, 27 Ewing St., and a motorcycle driven by Randall Phillips, 42 Weber Drive, collided, resulting in \$600 property damage.

Phillips, age 19, received abrasions when knocked to the pavement.

Halton council will attempt to rebuild its broken-down county health unit operation when it takes on a new Medical Officer of Health on September 1st.

The health unit has been plagued by problems during recent years, and these include the loss of staff and a dragged out dispute involving public health nurses working for the county.

The dispute with the nurses has lasted nearly two years, with still no signs of a break.

During September of last year the nurses walked off the job, but later returned. Then Halton health officer Dr. Archie Bull quit, leaving the unit without a director for several weeks.

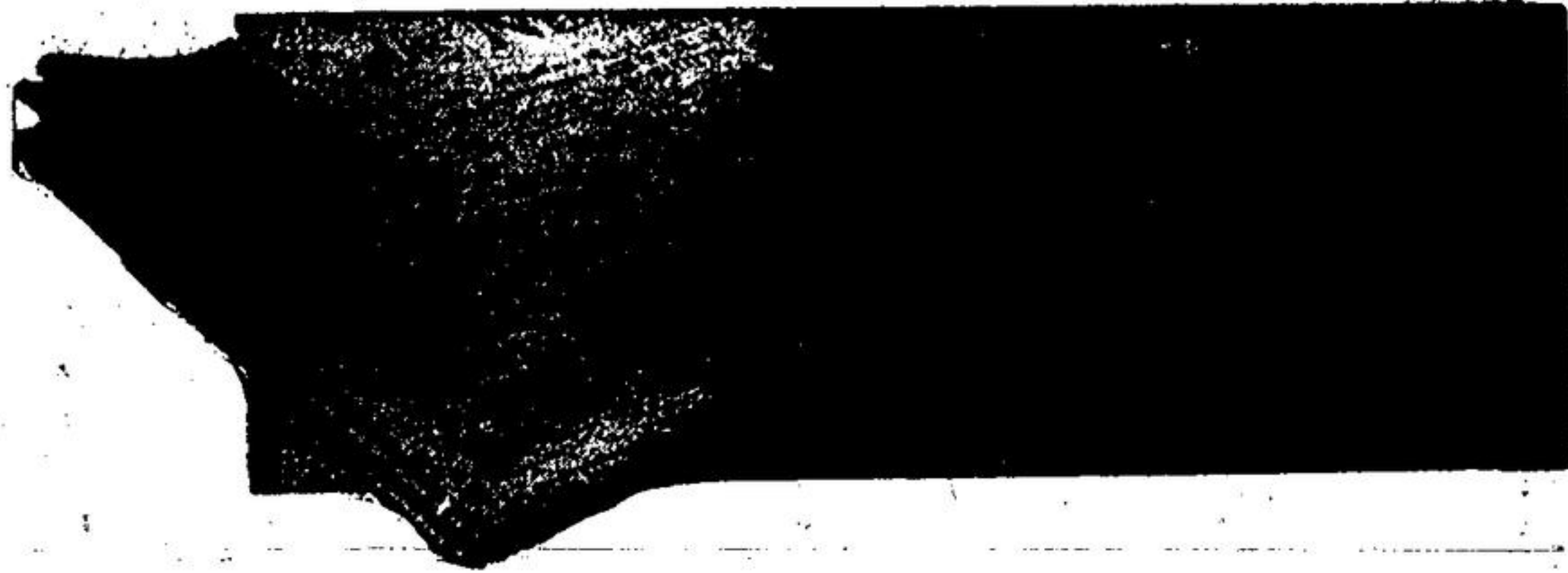

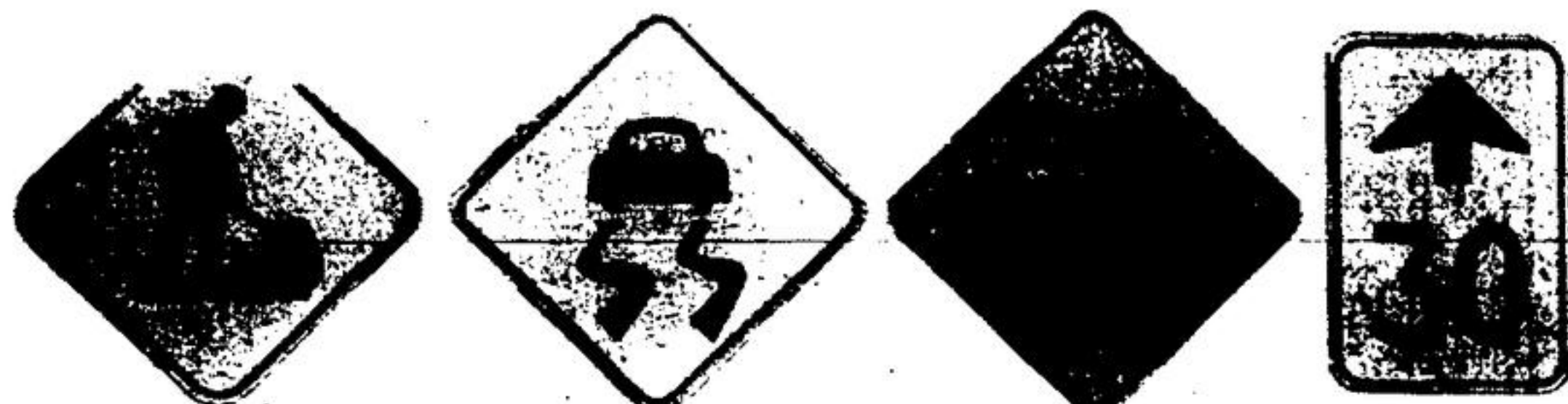
