

Hire Engineering Firm To Plot Road Program

The engineering firm of Phillips & Roberts has been engaged by the town council to design and supervise Georgetown's 1967 road program.

Council voted for the appointment of Phillips & Roberts last week, after road chairman W. R. Smith explained that town engineer Nick Kirewskie had said he could not handle field work for a program this size and maintain administrative work in the office.

"He says he could do the job," Mr. Smith told council, "but is reluctant to tackle it under the circumstances."

He explained that the engineer would have to have two field men to assist and if such men could be hired, it would mean an expense of \$75 to \$100 a day for six weeks.

Reeve Hunter who, with Mayor Gibbons and Cr. Emmerson opposed the engineering appointment, said that last year council had piled too much work on the engineering office, but appointment of a zoning and building inspector has relieved this.

"If our road program had been started a couple of months ago he might have had time to do it," he observed.

Cr. Smith said that he is not happy with having to hire a firm for the job, but must either recommend this or scrap the year's road program.

Mayor Gibbons expressed concern at a \$20,000 expenditure for engineering which he said should be done by the engineering department.

"We have Damas & Smith and Proctor & Redfern on our payroll, our own engineer and now Phillips & Roberts," he said.

Cr. Ballentine said rapid development in both ends of town takes more and more of the engineer's time and he would hate to lose any subsidy payments because of field work cutting in on administration time.

Cr. Emerson suggested that the town foreman might be given the job of checking subsidies to allow more field time.

"The problem is whether we are going to hire this firm or fool around and get nothing done at all," was Cr. Harrison's opinion.

Mayor Gibbons said some councillors were linking surveying with engineering and that it would be possible to engage surveyors without having an engineering firm on the job.

The motion carried with support of Crs. Smith, Francis, Ballentine Harrison and Young. Deputy Reeve Speight was absent from the meeting.

Later a motion to hire a civil technician for the engineering office lost out on a 4-3 vote, when only Crs. Smith, Francis and Young supported it.

Promises Heavy Fines For Teen-Age Drinkers

The preaching is over and from now on its action. That's the attitude of Halton County Magistrate James Black with regards to underage drinkers.

In court Wednesday Magistrate Black decided that when preaching fails it's time to change tactics, and fined two Georgetown youths a total of \$300 or two months in jail for drinking under 21.

The youths, were charged following their arrest by Georgetown police in the Park Public School yard, June 3.

One of the youths said he had two pints of ale and the other admitted to drinking one mouthful.

Said Magistrate Black, "for several years this court has preached to the young people of the dangers they are taking when they break the law."

"The court quite recently decided that preaching was not doing much good and it warned persons that it was increasing the penalties that it had normally imposed, in the hope that it might bring home to young people that they may not break this law."

Magistrate Black warned that if his stiff fines failed to have the desired effect of cutting down the numbers of drinking teens they might be increased to as high as \$500 or three months in the county jail.

One of the accused was given 30 days to pay his fine, the other, layed off from his job, was given 60 days to pay.

Will Expropriate Acreage Near Georgetown for Dam

Halton Region Conservation Authority will file expropriation plans against eight owners of 150 acres near Georgetown — the first step toward a \$600,000 dam on the middle branch of the Sixteen Mile Creek.

The 45-foot dam is designed to provide continuous stream flow throughout the summer months. It would back up the middle branch of the creek into an artificial lake a mile long and 60 feet wide.

David Mallory, Conservation file officer, said the expropriation plans are a formality which will make land negotiations more uniform.

The provincial government has provided a 75 per cent subsidy for the project, he said.

Expect Defoggers, Trees Overcome Odour Problem

At a meeting last week, council heard a report from Walter Pacholok, newly appointed zoning administrator, about action which the Dornier firm has taken to overcome an odour problem from a waste settling bed at the plant.

Mr. Pacholok said that if a defogger which the mill is using were to run continuously, this with the growth of trees which have been planted around the property, should eliminate the problem.

"The problem is 95% solved," said Cr. Ballentine. "The smell has been almost eliminated since the defoggers arrived, and they are testing new chemicals with the hope that this will overcome it altogether."

Cr. Emmerson explained that the odour is circulated by clinging to moisture in the air and is dispersed by the defoggers, breaking up moisture particles.

"I checked and if they are used they will do the job," said Cr. Harrison. "They are using a pine odour now and its refreshing."

"I don't know the technicalities but I know a smell and it's there almost every night," said Mayor Gibbons, who has been outspoken on the question.

He said the onus is on the company to eliminate it and he knows it can be done.

"We've had delegations and they'll be here again unless we continue to press for action," he said.

Ask Permission, Advice To Groundhog Hunters

The Ontario Department of Lands and Forests has been receiving complaints from landowners in this area that some motorists are stopping and taking shots at groundhogs on pastures and hillsides from the roads and in some cases without leaving their vehicles.

"This is a lazy form of sport if we presume that hunting is a way to enjoy outdoor exercise," a Department spokesman commented. "Walking the fields with a gun usually involves getting permission from the landowner. Besides any legal question of trespassing it is merely good manners to let the farmer know that he can expect to hear some hot lead sizzling about his back 40."

In broken terrain it is possible for a man or livestock to wander into the line of fire. Even on flat land a ricochet can deflect a bullet in any direction.

Because of these problems and the danger of carrying loaded firearms in cars and on motorcycles, laws are in effect making it an offence to shoot from or across a travelled road or to carry a loaded firearm in a vehicle.
