LOCATION OF THE LANDS AFFECTED

This Amendment applies to lands in the vicinity of the railway station, in an area east of Queen Street, between King Street and the Canadian National Railway

PROPOSED CHANGE

It is proposed to reduce the industrial designation in this area to a narrow strip abutting the railway tracks; the King Street frontage would be designated Residential. MEETING
