Seeks Permission for Store on Maple East

A touching letter from a recently widowed mother of three stirred council, Monday night, to "cut through the red tape" to quote Cr. Jim Young. Mrs. M. Christie, 137 Maple Avenue East asked council for permission to operate a fish and chip store from her nine room house. She maintained she did not want to accept mother's allowance or welfare, but felt she could make a go of this as a friend had sold her all the equipment cheaply.
She contended that the location near factories would be an ideal spot for such a service, and closed the letter by stating "I want to stand on my own feet."
"This lady is to be admired" remarked Cr. Robert Francis, "and should be helped in every way."
"Let's cut the red tape," added Cr. Young, "and hand this direct to Zoning Administrator Walter Pacholok, rather than hold for committee meetings, which could hold this up for two more weeks."
The mayor pointed out if the area is zoned to permit this, there is nothing to stop Mrs. Christie going into business.
Cr. Roy Ballentine claimed one side of the road is M2 and the other side B4, either of which would permit neighbourhood stores.
The letter was turned over to the Zoning Administrator for an answer by this Thursday's committee meeting.

SALUTES

Sir George Etienne Cartier

He participated in almost all the great events of his times. As a youth, he fought for responsible government in the rebellion of 1837. As a director of the Grand Trunk Railway, he helped build Canada's communication system.

He codified Quebec's civil law, abolished the seigneurial system, led Lower Canada into Confederation, set up Canada's defence system, and single-handedly negotiated the transfer of the West to Canada - first from the hard-resisting Hudson's Bay Company, and again from the armed opposition of Red River. It was Cartier, too, who wrote the constitution of the Province of Manitoba.

And he still found time to write poetry!

Love of Canada, admiration for British institutions, and fear of United States annexationism and influences, were the keynotes in Cartier's politics. In Confederation he saw a way to keep Canada out of U.S. hands, and to preserve here the British political system which alone could protect French-Canada's life. And it was Cartier's tremendous influence that won Lower Canada's approval for Confederation.

Mixed with his political ideals was a long and intimate friendship with Macdonald, his fellow Conservative leader, co-Prime Minister in the days of United Upper and Lower Canada - in every way his closest colleague and partner.

Contemporaries claimed Macdonald depended on Cartier's personal support and could hardly get along without him. One thing is certain. When a cable reached Parliament in 1873, that Cartier had died in England of the Bright's disease he had gone to have treated, Macdonald collapsed in tears on his Commons' desk, unable to continue the day's sitting.

COUNCIL BRIEFS

Monday night, council appointed Tom James acting assessment commissioner, and increased his car allowance by thirty dollars a month.
They also appointed Guy Rodgers acting weed inspector until the return of Mr. A.C. McBride.

Council authorized the purchase of a camera for the assessment department for the cost not to exceed seventy-five dollars.
They also authorized the issuing of a cheque for \$4,000 to the Planning Board, which is the balance of their 1967 budget.

Council hired Randy Grace, 51 Ann Street, to cut weeds with a sycyte at \$1.50 per hour.

The minutes of the North Halton Urban Board meeting read to council revealed no Georgetown member was present.

The Georgetown Public School Board requested council to raise \$186,578 through debentures for the addition to the George Kennedy School. The addition consists of four classrooms and a library. The general contract amounts to \$162,538, architect's fees \$9,750, furnishings \$10,000 and contingencies \$4,000.

No Worries, Says Norval Teen Bound For Israel

A Norval teenager who started this week on a six week visit to Israel says he has no worries about the situation there. John McGee, age 17, discussed the matter with a 16 year old Israeli girl before starting the trip. The girl is Miriam Schine, who is also taking part in the exchange plan. The plan is sponsored by a Jewish Group, the Pioneer Women of Canada. Miriam and John communicated mainly in sign language at their first meeting in the Hospitality Pavilion at Expo '67. A student at an agricultural high school, Miss Schine lives at Bat Yam, a suburb of Tel Aviv. Her father manages a co-operative farm. John was born and raised on his parents' farm and has been active in 4-H Club activities since he was 12. At present he is majoring in political science at Toronto's York University.

For the contest leading up to his selection, John had to write a piece on why he was interested in making the Israeli visit. There were nine other contestants.

Speaking through an interpreter, Miriam, 16, said she is looking forward to finding out what life is like in Canada. She is to travel from Halifax to Victoria under the guidance of officials from the Pioneer Women and the 4-H organization. In Israel, John will travel with a student his own age. The exchange program was planned by the 3,000-member Pioneer group.
