Milton Couple Sight Brightly Lit UFOs

Two unidentified flying objects were spotted over the Niagara Escarpment this week by Milton cabbie Fred Rigo and his wife.

Mr. Rigo said they saw a bright light in the sky hovering over the top of the "mountain" for half an hour from midnight to 12:30 a.m., Monday.

"It looked like a bright star, but it was not a star," Mr. Rigo said.

"It seemed to hover in the sky for half an hour and then vanished as the sun's rays left it."

Mr. Rigo surmised that the rays of the sun were reflecting off a shiny surface for the half hour he and his wife watched the sky.

He said shortly after the appearance of the first UFO another streaked across the sky and they rendezvoused at a point south-west of the town, over Burlington.

"The second one then flew off, leaving the other still hovering until it vanished," said Mr. Rigo.

North Halton O.P.P. detachment has no record of the sighting. "No one telephoned us, and they usually do," a spokesman said.
