In the end, acting manager Len Andrews brought in left-hander Jack Roberts to finish up a one-hit, 3-0 victory over the Georgetown Giants.

Hamilton pitched along with little difficulty until the sixth inning, allowing the Giants to hit the ball out of the infield against him on just two other occasions.

The knuckleballer had fanned seven and walked just one batter when he ran afoul of control problems with one out in the sixth inning.

When he walked Jim James and Don Lindsay to bring the tying run to the plate, he moved quickly to bring in Roberts to finish up.

The pitching dramatics of Hamilton and Roberts over shadowed a fine performance by losing pitcher Don Westbrook.

Westbrook was never in much difficulty, except for the fourth inning when the Merchants came up with all of their runs. He gave up just seven hits, fanned five and walked nobody.

In that fourth inning, Dredge started things off by reaching base on an error by Jim James at shortstop. Dredge went to second on a passed ball but was unable to advance when Ken Moore lifted a Texas League to left-centre.

Elliott brought in Dredge with a single and Moore scored on George Chester's infield out. Larry McPhall brought Elliott home with a single to left.
