

Issue Rules For Police Soap Box Derby Entrants

With the date of the Centennial Soap Box Derby set for September 16, on the Maple Avenue Hill, it is time for all the would-be racing champs to get working on the hot rods.

All the regulations are set out here and must be strictly adhered to, or you may be disqualified.

Date of Race: September 16
Location: Maple Ave. Hill

1) Obey the rules: (a) The Soap Box Derby is strictly a boy's event. Its aim is to promote both craftsmanship and sportsmanship through competition in building and driving Soap Box racing cars. When you enter the Soap Box Derby contest, you offer to put your skill in building and driving against that of other boys. Therefore, sportsmanship, or fair play, requires that your car shall represent only your own skill as its designer and builder just as when it comes to the race, your performance will represent your own skill as a driver.

(b) These rules are designed to ensure an equal opportunity to all entrants and thus to further the spirit of fair play. Therefore, follow the Official Rules to the letter and, as a true sportsman, enjoy the thrill of putting your own ability against the best of the field to offer.

(c) Know the Rules: Study these rules over and over, and refer to them often while you are building your car. For your car will be carefully inspected before the race, and may be barred from competition if you have overlooked or broken any rule.

(d) REMEMBER — IGNORANCE OF THE RULE IS NO EXCUSE.

2 Age Limit: All boys 10 years and over and under 16 years, September 1, 1967, are eligible for the 1967 races. Proof of age must be presented on request.

3 Eligible cars and drivers: These cars must be entered and driven by the boys who built them originally. The driver of each racer must be the boy who built the entire car.

Rules for Building your Car

4. Car Must Be Boy Built:

Except as stated hereafter in these rules, the work required in the designing and building of a Soap Box Derby car — making and shaping the separate parts of the chassis and body, and joining the parts to form the completed car must be performed mainly by the entrant. NOTE: Helpers may assist the entrant only in putting together the completed parts of the car, in aligning wheels and axles, and in assembling and adjusting steering and braking systems. Helpers are not permitted to build entrant's car, or parts of the car. The car must be built by the boy who will drive it in the race.

5. Wheels, Axles, Bearings:

(a) All cars must run on four wheels.

6. Wheel Tread: Neither front nor rear wheel tread shall be less than 30 inches or more than 35 inches. NOTE: Wheel tread is the distance between the two front wheels or two back wheels.

7. Wheelbase: Every car shall have a wheelbase of not less than 40 inches and not more than 60 inches. NOTE: Wheelbase is the distance from the centre of the front wheel hub to the centre of the rear wheel hub on the same side of the car.

8. Length: The over-all length of the car shall not exceed 80 inches.

9. Width: The over-all width of the car shall not exceed 42 inches.

10. Height and Road Clearance: (a) The over-all height of the car and the windshield, shall not exceed 28 inches. Only the steering wheel may extend above the allowed over-all height.

(b) Every car must have a road clearance of at least 3 inches, with the driver in the car, outside of brake. The nose of the car must not be more than eight inches from the ground, nor more than 11 inches in front of the axle. This rule must be strictly enforced as a deviation from this rule will become a hazard.

11. Weight: Cab and Driver: The combined weight of the car and driver must not be more than 250 pounds, including ballast if used.

12. Body Construction: (a) The body must not confine the driver's head, and it must be wide enough to permit the driver to have free use of his hands. The body must be built so as to permit inspection of all parts of the

car. NO canopies or enclosures must be wound on the steering post, or drum, in such a manner that the front axles or wheels will steer in the same direction as the steering wheel is turned. The cable drum must be round.

(b) Cockpits must be open at the top, but closed permanently at sides and back, not less than 8 inches above seat level.

(c) Windshield: Non-shatterable transparent plastic may be used for windshields or "Blister" if properly designed and secured. No Glass.

13. Steering: (a) Safety: The utmost care must be taken in designing and installing the steering system to ensure easy, positive control and safe operation. A car whose steering, in the opinion of the Inspection Committee, does not fully meet the requirements of safety will be barred, until made safe.

(b) Steering Position: The body and seat must be so built that the driver sits in a normal driving position (as in an automobile), permitting easy operation of steering and brakes and a clear view to the front and both sides. The driver may lean forward in his seat during the race, but must keep eyes on the road at all times. A reclining position (leaning back) is prohibited.

(c) Steering must be by a hand-controlled wheel.

(d) The steering control must operate the front axle, (on a kingpin) or the front wheels (as on an automobile). Rear-end steering is not permitted.

(e) If the car is steered by swinging the front axle, axle movement must be limited so that the front wheels cannot touch any part of the car.

(f) Suggested Steering Devices are: wheel, half-wheel, airplane-type wheel.

(g) Steering Wheel — must be above the level of the driver's legs when the driver is in a sitting position.

(h) Steering Cables: Steering may be by flexible connections, which must be of woven wire cable (flexible pre-formed 1/4" or more in diameter, or cable of similar strength, is necessary). Sash cord 1/4 inch or 3/8 inch will be allowed.

(i) Steering cables must be fitted with two turnbuckles (one on each side) or similar adjusting devices, to permit easy tightening of slack. For safety, all turnbuckles must be wired or otherwise locked so that they cannot unscrew.

(j) Cables must be firmly attached. Soldered connections are unsafe, and are prohibited.
