

Fire Safety Measures For Those on Vacation

Leaving for your holidays? Make sure your home is free of fire hazards before you leave it empty for a week or two, members of the Halton Fire Prevention Bureau urged today.

The Bureau has provided this handy checklist of safety precautions every homeowner should take before heading out for a holiday:

- Check your yard and garage to see that they are tidy. Empty the gas from your lawnmower and lock it inside where children cannot reach it.
- Unplug your lamps, appliances, radios and television sets, and disconnect the aerial lead-in on the back of your TV. (If lightning strikes your home it will probably hit the TV antenna and taking these precautions ensures the lightning will ground out rather than roar through your house, burning wires and blowing out appliances.) You will probably want to leave your refrigerator and freezer plugged in, but pull the plug out of everything else.
- Check throughout the house for flammable liquids and put them away in a safe place. Make sure you haven't any oily or paint-soaked rags sitting around.
- If you have a gas-fired furnace, pull the switch and shut off the gas cocks.
- Notify the police department and neighbours of your absence, so they can keep an eye on the house.
- Just before you leave, check all the ashtrays for smouldering cigarette butts.

Norval-Bred Jersey Is Silver Medallist

The Jersey bull, Brampton B P Kavor, Excellent, Senior Superior, Silver Medal Sire has just been designated a Gold Medal bull by the Canadian Jersey Cattle Club on the high production of his daughters. He now has 37 tested daughters that have an average production m. e. of 10,147 lbs. milk, 543 lbs. fat, 5.35% and 36 classified daughters that average 86.56%.

This bull was bred by B.H. Bull & Son, Norval, and is owned by Mrs. Clara Toth, Newmarket, Ontario. His sire Brampton Pinnacle Basil, Excellent, Silver and Gold Medal Superior and Century Sire, has 160 tested daughters that average 8,898 lbs. milk, 521 lbs. fat, 5.89% and 160 classified 85.91%.

Brampton Kava Basilus, Excellent, his dam, has 4 records, including that made at 2 years 67 days when she produced 9,703 lbs. milk, 496 lbs. fat, 5.11% SM.

The Jersey bull Brampton Marvel, Excellent, Silver Medal Superior Sire, has also been designated a Gold Medal bull by the Canadian Jersey Cattle Club on the high production of his daughters. His 17 tested daughters have an average m. e. production of 10,858 lbs. milk, 567 lbs. fat, 5.22%, and 16 classified average 83.34%.

Brampton Marvel was bred and is owned by B.H. Bull & Son, Norval. He is a son of Brampton Radar, Excellent Silver and Gold Medal Senior Superior Century Sire, with 118 tested daughters that average 9,833 lbs. milk, 505 lbs. fat, 5.14% and 134 classified 86.74%.

His dam Brampton WR Lus Pinn, Excellent is a Ton of Gold and 4,000 lbs. cow with a Lifetime Production in 7 lactations, of 121,482 lbs. milk, 6,737 lbs. fat.

The Jersey bull, Nurseland Farineuse Victor, Excellent Silver Medal Superior Sire, has just been designated a Gold Medal bull by the Canadian Jersey Cattle Club on the high production of his daughters. He has 22 tested daughters with an average production m. e. of 10,523 lbs. milk, 512 lbs. fat, 4.86% and 23 classified 86.09%.

This bull was bred and is owned by Fred Nurse, Georgetown. His sire, Farineuse Dreamer Very Good, has 112 tested daughters that average 9,110 lbs. milk, 444 lbs. fat, 4.88% and 105 classified that average 85.60%.

Nurseland Victory, Maid, his dam, has 3 records including that made at 3 years 18 days when she produced 8,029 lbs. milk, 428 lbs. fat 5.33 per cent in 288 days.

Cr. 'Tut' Harrison claimed there were a great many cars behind the building that didn't look as if they could be repaired.
Deputy Reeve Arthur Speight said there is a fence preventing anything unsightly being seen from the street. "He has cars there he is taking parts off," said the deputy-reeve, "it's his livelihood." He urged council should talk to Mr. Tolton, the owner, before jumping in with an official notice.
"Taking parts off one car to fix another is wrecking" charged Cr. Harrison.
"The motion passed with only the deputy reeve opposed."

Ask Council to State Legal Reason for Turndown

Steve Emmerson again challenged council Monday night, to state publicly a specific legal reason for the refusal to grant an apartment permit for his land on Mountainview Road.

Mr. G. Thomas of Cooksville intends to build a fifty-six suite apartment on land owned by Mr. Emmerson, but the deal hinges on the acquiring of a building permit.

Mr. Emmerson pointed out that the zoning by-law declares the area R4, "and apartments are a permissive use in an R4 area," said he. "You're trying to change the rules in the middle of the game," he charged.

While agreeing that Reeve Hunter, who handled the deal, and Cr. "Steamer" Emmerson, his brother, might not feel entitled to vote on the question, he claimed they were shirking their duty by not voicing an opinion.

Cr. Emmerson replied that he interprets the Act to mean he could not even discuss it. The mayor agreed, saying any member who has declared a conflict of interest cannot discuss the subject.

Cr. Roy Ballentine pointed out that the town retains municipal consultants, whom they asked to set out the basic requirements for an apartment area, some of which are community facilities such as shopping, library, churches, etc., ease of access to arterial traffic flow, compatibility with neighbourhood use, and available school facilities. Most of these should be within walking distance, said Cr. Ballentine.

Cr. "Tut" Harrison emphasized that the sewers could handle the extra load. "If the Planning Board wants to turn down something, it should be based on fact not on surmise, I challenge the statement made previously that the sewers could not handle the load," he added.

Speaking on the same subject, a ratepayer, James McCaig asked Cr. Ballentine if these regulations had been incorporated into the zoning by-law, or would be in the future. "If it's in the future they do not apply now," he claimed.

Quoting from the Herald he said Mr. P. K. Beckmans, planning consultant, had stated there were fewer children in high density apartments than in medium density areas. "Why shouldn't a school be provided if necessary, they have been everywhere else?" He pointed out there was no school in the Wimpey area.

He contended neighbourhood stores make no difference, and asked if they were allowed in an R4 area anyway. In conclusion he took a verbal swipe at council's action in starting expropriation proceedings against Dominion Seed House. "Isn't the decent and proper thing to do, to approach the people first?" he contended the Plunkett Report could make a municipal building obsolete anyway.

Cr. Ballentine claimed that before the plan was amended council had no control over what went into an R4 zone. "Apartments should be in a proper area, not all over, leaving the town with pockets of high density and low density buildings." He reminded Mr. McCaig that Moore Park was all zoned, and thought a school was already planned in the area.

Replying to another of Mr. McCaig's questions, Cr. Ballentine stated plazas and stores are not permitted in R4.

"Then why did you use that as a reason for refusal?" interjected Steve Emmerson.

Five Percent Pay Hike Granted County Employees

County council agreed to grant a five per cent across-the-board increase to county employees who are not under the Labour Relations Act. The raise will be retroactive to May 1st, 1967.

Council approved the increase after the personnel committee rejected a motion July 11, by Warden W. J. Coulter to grant the raise. Following Warden Coulter's motion at that meeting, Reeve H. H. Hinton of Aton, moved that the personnel officer be requested to undertake a job evaluation study of all employees in Halton.

Cost of Living
The committee then put down a motion to grant a five per cent cost of living increase to all employees except supervisory personnel.

Finally the personnel committee approved a motion to take no action at that time.

At last week's meeting of the council, Deputy Reeve W. Hoey of Nassageweys said the only way to keep the employees satisfied and thus insure a good administration was to grant the raise.

"If we expect a fair day's work, we must give a fair day's pay," he said.

Frank Rogers, Deputy Reeve of Burlington, in supporting the motion said that in the past employees have lost faith in the council because of the lack of action on the county's part.

The council must provide the men with more than just promises, he said.

Job Study
Deputy Reeve Charles Meneby of Milton said it would be more beneficial to the employees to wait for a proper job evaluation next fall.

LOCATION OF THE LANDS AFFECTED
This Amendment applies to lands in the vicinity of the railway station, in an area east of Queen Street, between King Street and the Canadian National Railway tracks.

PROPOSED CHANGE
It is proposed to reduce the industrial designation in this area to a narrow strip abutting the railway tracks; the King Street frontage would be designated Residential.
