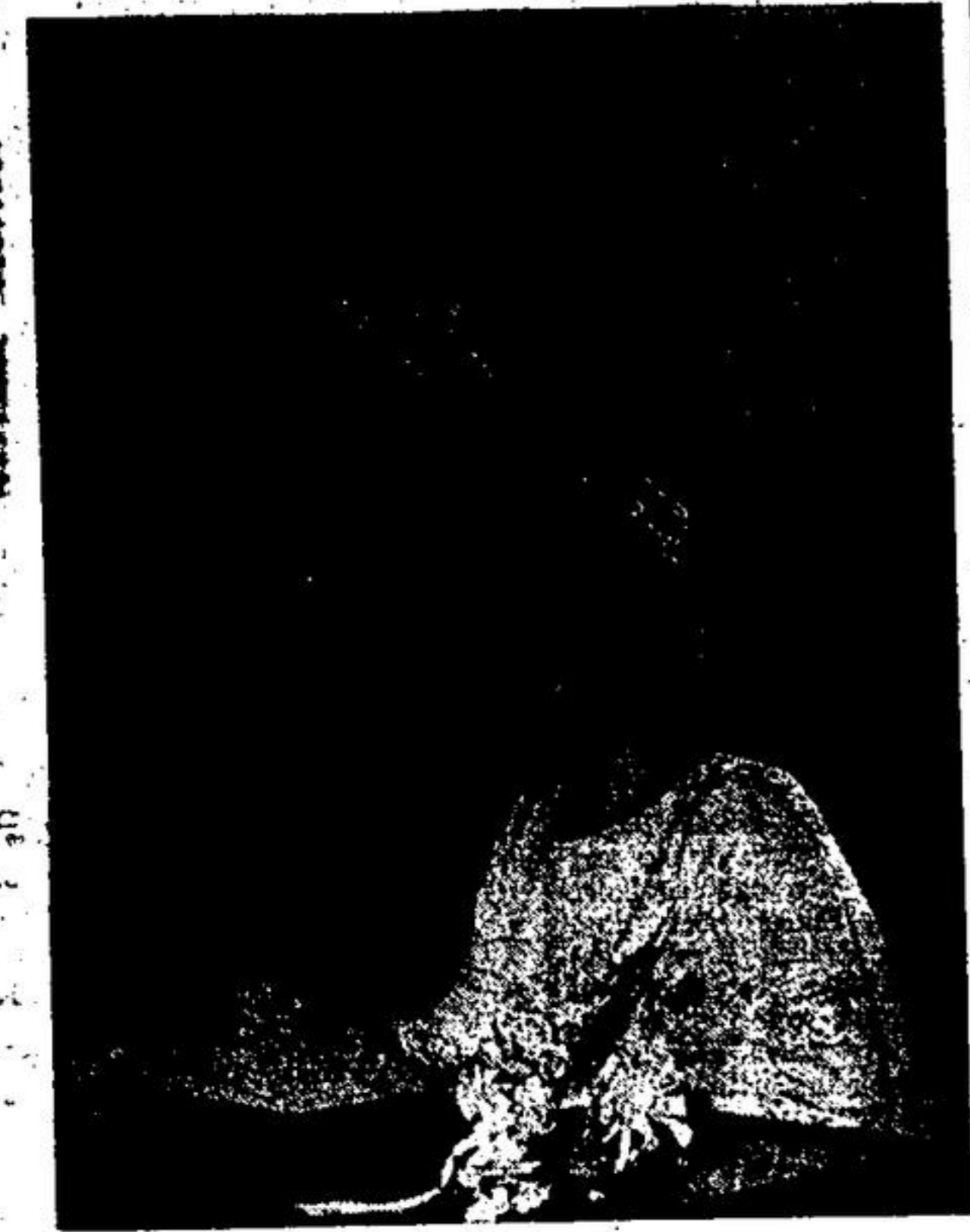


Married Here, Will Live In Prince Edward Island

Brother Will Captain New Q4 Luxury Liner

Captain William (Bill) Warwick who will captain the gigantic luxury liner that will replace the famous Queen Mary and Queen Elizabeth liners when they retire within 18 months is the brother of a Georgetown man, Roy Warwick, 7 Prince Charles Drive.

Captain Warwick's list of commands reads like a Who's Who of distinguished British ships. He has commanded the Alsatia, Asia, Assyria, Andria, Media, Carinthia, Sylvania, Ivernia, Caronia, Mauretania, Queen Elizabeth and Queen Mary.

At age 54, he is the youngest man to have captained the Queens.

In a story in a recent issue of the Star Weekly Captain Warwick told author Alexander Fraser:

"As a nipper," he recalls, "I was sent to a minor public school. Soon after arrival I decided, after considerable reflection, that I would comb my hair straight back. I felt it suited me better.

"But one day my housemaster called me in and said 'Warwick I don't like it. I think you'd better have a parting.' No sir, I said. The housemaster said 'But damnit, Warwick, all my boys have partings.' Not this one, sir, I said, and went to pack my bags.

"I left with my head high and my hair combed back, but my father, a Birkenhead architect, seemed to think he had a problem child on his hands and sent me to the naval training vessel Conway. That sort of decided things; otherwise I might have been an architect too, which I would have liked. I love creative work. Anyway, I have great sympathy for these kids today who like to wear their hair long."
