Chris, John and another friend, Jack Brower, found the eggs and nest near the sewage disposal plant. Chris adopted one of the foundlings, and John and Jack became the mother of two apiece. "I made the incubator with two sides wood and two sides glass and wood bottom and top," John told The Herald. "I plastered the sides with putty and hung a 25 watt bulb from the lid. Part of the bulb was broken away to increase the heat. I turned the eggs twice a day until they hatched." The conscientious young mothers keep their newborn in a cardboard box and daily allow them a dip in a backyard wading pool.



Mississauga Popular Choice Tops Names For New Town

Rotarians Welcome District Governor on Monday Visit

Howard L. Wright of Toronto, Governor of the Rotary District of this area, addressed the local Rotary Club Monday during his official visit. Georgetown is one of 52 Rotary Clubs in this district.

Speaking of the global growth of Rotary he said, "Rotary is the pioneer of the service clubs and today numbers more than 12,785 clubs with a combined membership of more than 623,500 business and professional men. Spread throughout 134 countries in all parts of the world, Rotary Clubs meet every day of the week and conduct activities to improve their communities, aid youth, elevate business standards and further international friendship and understanding."

The District Governor also conferred with Dick Looze, local Rotary Club president, and Des Nicholls, club secretary, on matters of club administration and plans for future service activities.

Referring to the programme of Luther Lodges of Chapel Hill North Carolina, President of Rotary International for 1967-1968, the Rotary governor said, "President Hodges has placed emphasis on the need for Rotarians everywhere to increase their personal involvement in Rotary. He believes that a man's membership in Rotary becomes more meaningful through his own individual efforts to better his community, maintain high standards in his business or profession, and develop an understanding of the problems of other nations."

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Meaford Man Farmed at Hornby, Acton

Van Bots Construction Co. of Toronto has been awarded a \$3,385,900 contract to build the new Vanier Institution for Women at Brampton, the Ontario works department announced Monday.

The correctional institute, scheduled for completion in 1968, will replace the 27 year old Mercer reformatory in Toronto's west end. The new reformatory will be built on a 30 acre site adjacent to the reform institutions department's Ingle-side centre for girls.

The Vanier Institution, designed by public works department architects in association with Toronto architect Harry Kohl, will include 10 one-storey wings, some of them detached and others connected by corridors.

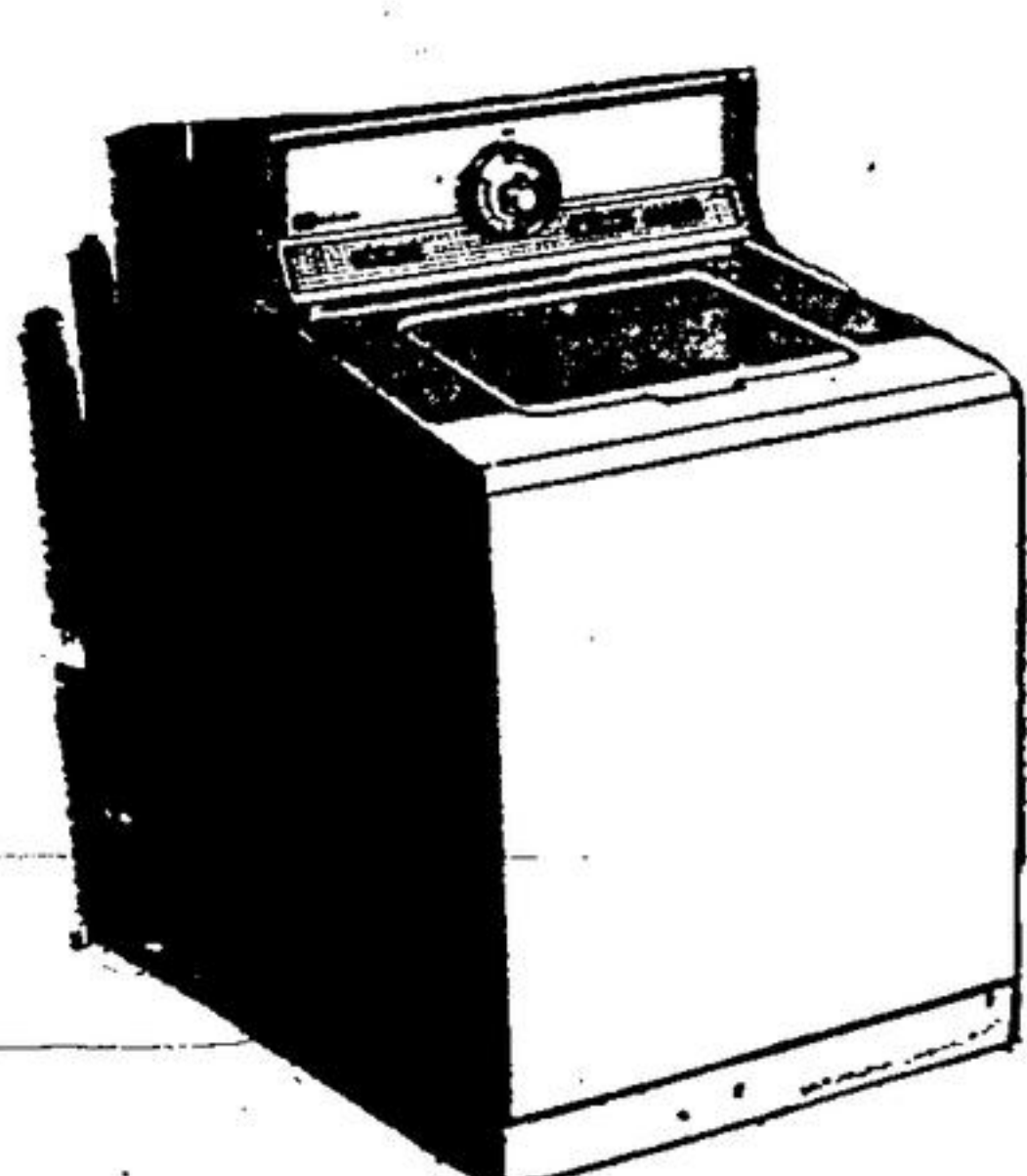
