Baseball Juniors Fail to Qualify for Regina Berth

The Georgetown Junior baseball entry into the Nationals at Regina was shot down when Beeton stopped them 5-2 in Beeton on Sunday night.

The Juniors were below form and Beeton pushed five big runs across before the Juniors started their move. Danny Arbie was knocked for eight big hits and five runs before retiring in favour of Mike Tost.

It was a case of waiting too long to move as the juniors got their first run in the seventh and their second in the eighth and went down with bases loaded in the ninth inning. Georgetown's hitters were Ridall, Densmore and Arbie with singles and Maloney, and Ford with two apiece. Georgetown had 7 hits and two runs. Beeton collected 9 hits and 5 runs. Georgetown fans (maybe 20) were overwhelmed by the number of Beeton fans (they filled the stands and then some) and the vocal support they give their team. Manager Richmond was amazed at the sight of hard-bat lights in such a small com-

Community. Beeton now plays Welland, the winner to play Sarnia for the right to represent Ontario at Regina in August.
The Juniors have suffered the same fate as the Juveniles in the rained-out department. They have managed only two games in three weeks. They edged the Juveniles 3-1 and trounced Campbellville 8-0. Big bats were Ridall, Maloney, Arbie and Ford with two each, Anderson, Tost and Patton with singles and Wayne Marchand with three big blows one a double. This will be an all Junior game with Milton bringing their junior age intermediates to tune Georgetown up for the upcoming Thorold Junior Tournament.

The tournament will be held on the civic weekend, August 4, 5, 6 and 7th, in Thorold or vicinity. Georgetown will know their opposition and playing dates sometime this week. There are 16 Junior teams entered.

COUNCIL BRIEFS

Council on Monday authorized payment of \$500 to the Georgetown Baseball Association to help with their recreation programme.

They also authorized the Cemetery Board grant of \$7,000, as set in the budget, be paid.

A by-law will be prepared whereby any applicant for rezoning will pay the costs.

A motion to have engineers Philips and Roberts include the sewers in John and Mountainview Road, in their survey to determine their adequacy to service high density apartments was passed.

Council okayed the paying of forty-five dollars to G. Avery for the lettering on the new ambulance.

New pumps for the John St. pumping station were ordered at a cost not to exceed \$10,000.

Permission was granted to Provincial Paper Ltd. on the recommendation of the Committee of Adjustments, to allow the mill to extend its office building to within eighteen feet of the lot line on Rosetta Street. The existing building comes within 29 feet. Present regulations call for fifty feet back from a lot line.

"A big boost for the September 23 parade," was how Cr. "Slemer" Emmerson described the news that the Canadian Legion is providing a band, a colour party and members to march in the parade.

Zoning Administrator Walter Pacholok, by letter, informed council that an excavation on Water Street had been fenced, and the grass cut.

SILVER'S SALUTES GEORGE BROWN

A fearless man. A fighter. George Brown, founder of the Toronto GLOBE, Father of Confederation, champion of democratic reform, was a man who would risk his career — or his life — for what he thought was right.

Scottish-born, like Macdonald, Brown came to Canada by way of New York. Like so many others of the Fathers, he came to the forefront of Canadian politics during the 1850's, using the editorial columns of the GLOBE to support the Liberal or Clear Grit Party which he came to lead.

Though he had no love for Macdonald, Cartier, and their Conservative Party, Brown saw greatness in the idea of Confederation. But the delicate balance of party strength in Canada during the 1850's and 60's would prevent the Conservatives from carrying Confederation alone. Realizing in 1864, that the opportunity of the Maritime Conference should not be let slip, Brown agreed to enter a coalition government with Macdonald and Cartier. In helping to form this "Great Coalition," Brown brought down on himself the anger of much of his own party. He never recovered the confidence and following of the straight-out Liberals, but George Brown won a far greater place in history than he would ever have had otherwise. In sacrificing his career by bringing over at least part of his followers to the coalition, Brown made Confederation possible, and won the gratitude of generations of Canadians.

In this Centennial year, we at Silver's are proud to salute George Brown, Father of Confederation — a great Canadian.

Sun-up to Sundown Allowable to Builders
