Costly Project, Diversion Road Slated for Hornby

A diversion road to divert the heavy traffic using Trafalgar Road off the Base Line in the Hornby area, will soon be a reality.

Property is presently being purchased in north Oakville and the southern portion of Esqueping Township for the "Hornby East Diversion" that will alleviate traffic and safety problems on the narrow Base Line between the point where the Seventh Line of Esqueping and Oakville's Trafalgar Road presently intersect it.

Construction is slated to begin next summer, according to roads superintendent D. J. Corbett.

The project is expected to be an expensive one — "hundreds of thousands" Mr. Corbett suggests.

The road will take north-bound Trafalgar Road traffic straight north over the Base Line intersection then curve slightly westerly and rejoin the Esqueping Seventh Line in the centre of Lot 3, the H. D. MacPherson property.

It would eliminate a dangerous left turn at the present Hornby East intersection where north-bound vehicles must cross a line of east-bound Base Line traffic where the Base Line motorist's view is hampered by a rise in the level of the land; also a right hand turn at the present Hornby West intersection.

Similarly, south-bound Seventh Line traffic will take the diversion road from Lot 3 in Esqueping, curving easterly to the Trafalgar Road; eliminating a left turn at the Hornby West corner and a right curve at Trafalgar Road.

Mr. Corbett said the scheme has been in the planning stages for several years now. It is one of the priority projects in the county's present five-year plan of road improvements, partly due to the rash of accidents at the Base Line—Trafalgar Road intersection.
