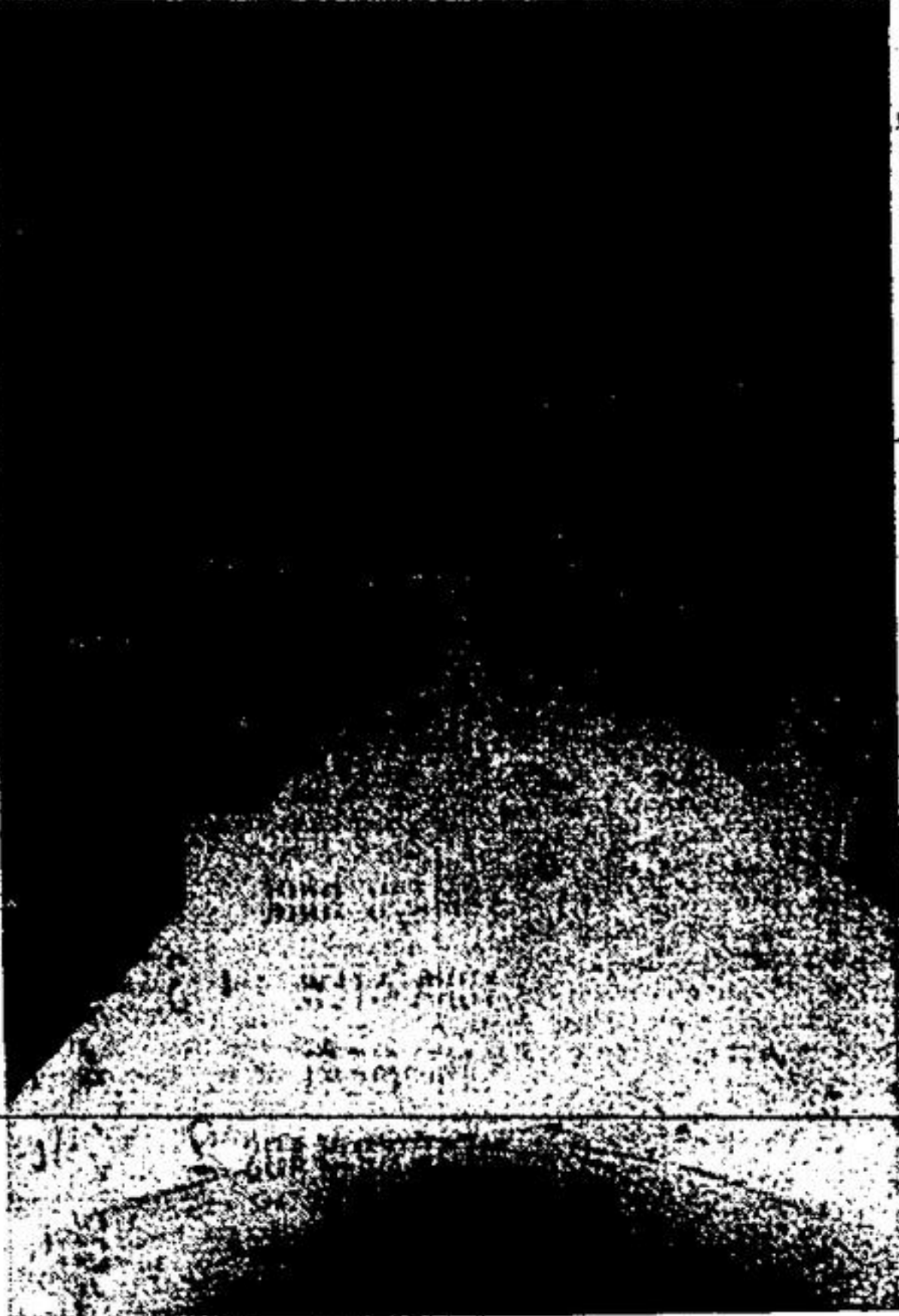


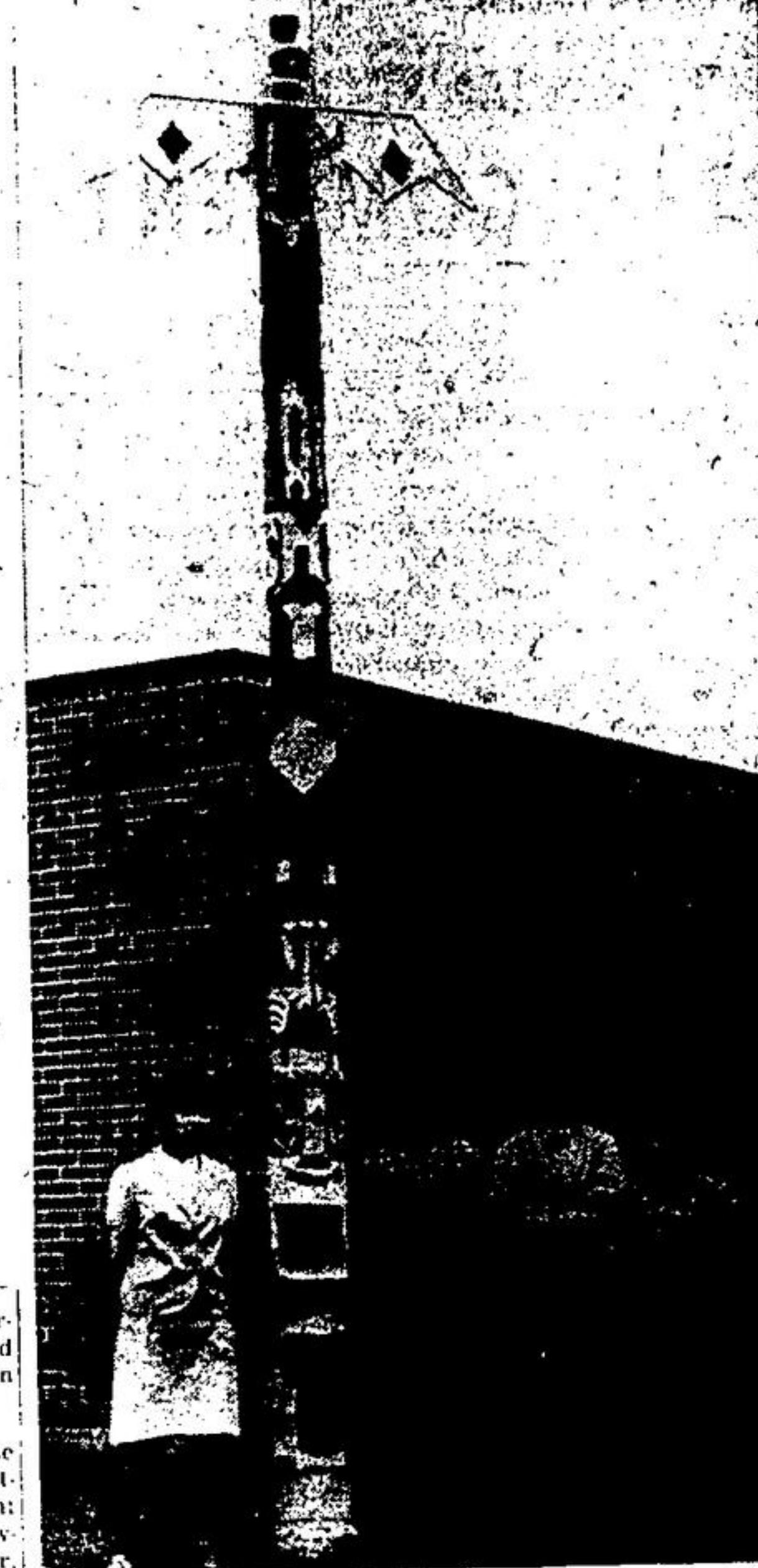
# How A Hydro Pole Became An Indian Totem

## Choose Trophy Winners In Livestock Judging

On July 9th, fifty one 4H and Junior Farmer members from Halton took part in the County Livestock Judging Competition at the University of Guelph. Participants were required to judge three classes of dairy cattle, one of sheep, three of beef, and one of hog carcasses. Reasons were given on two dairy classes, two beef, and one on sheep. Contestants were divided into three groups according to previous participation — novice, junior and senior.

In the Novice Group Norman Miller stood first, with a total score of 373 out of 650. Bob Lasby was second, and Judy Hardy third. In the Junior Division, Murray Brownridge topped the group with a total of 411, followed by Bob McGee, and Patricia Sweetman. Don Brander was head of the Senior Group, with a score of 411, with Larry Bennett second, and Lois Hunter third.

Trophies to be presented at the annual Awards night, for the high-novice, CNE Shield, Norman Miller; Champion Dairy Judge trophy, won by Bill Alexander; Champion Beef Judging Trophy, to Don Brander; Champion Sheep Judging Trophy, to Bill Alexander; Champion Livestock Judging Trophy, to Don Brander.

## Rockwood Ships Top Holsteins to Japan

Two royally bred Holstein bulls and two high class bred heifers have been shipped to Japan from Canada. Heading the group at what is reported to be a record price for a Canadian Holstein sold to Japan, was Roybrook Telstar, bred by Roy Ormiston, Brookville, Ontario, and owned by Mr. Ormiston, G. R. McLaughlin, Beaverton; Robert Fleit, Oshawa and H. A. Werry and Son, Oshawa, Ontario, under the name of the Telstar Syndicate. Telstar topped the National Holstein Sale of 1964 at \$25,000, on the bid of the Syndicate and has since been widely used in artificial service by Canadian and foreign breeders.

Orton Eby, St. George, sold the other bull, Selling Mark, who is a son of Selling Anna, one of the few cows ever to make 100,000 lbs. of milk in four lactations on twice a day milking. One of the bred heifers was from Glenaston Farms, Alliston, and the other from R. J. Stewart, Bolton. The cattle were shipped by Rockwood International, Georgetown. The buyer is a Federation of Agricultural Co-Operative Societies of Hokkaido, Hokuren, Japan.
