Dobson New Manager for Hydro's Central Region

A widely experienced Professional Engineer, Frank J. Dobson, 50, has been appointed Ontario Hydro's new Central Region Manager.

He has just taken over the post of heading up Hydro's most complex and densely populated region, succeeding Adam W. S. Smith who retired.

(Central Region extends along the Lake Ontario shore from Oakville nearly to Port Hope. The apex is at Sutton on Lake Simcoe. The Region includes such widely separated places as Georgetown, Bowmanville, Milton, Orono, Brampton and Port Perry.)

From 1961 to 1966, Mr. Dobson was on loan to the Government of Ghana in the responsible role of chief executive officer of the Volta River power authority charged with the task of constructing and administering the latter years of construction of this huge 883,000 kilowatt power development, in the heart of that important African nation.

The Volta River power scheme involved building a huge 2,100 ft. long, 375 ft. high rock dam, a nearby complementary saddle dam, and a powerhouse with four huge generators, also a townsite, hospital, etc. The power plant is located at Akosombo, some 70 miles northeast of Accra, the capital of Ghana.

The new development already has helped to spur industrial development in Ghana and to improve living conditions. Cost of the power project was about \$170 million. The funds were provided by Ghana and also from the World Bank, the United Kingdom and the United States.

Mr. Dobson, one of Hydro's best known construction engineers, was chosen by the Commission for the job in Ghana. The president of Ghana had asked a Canadian engineer to head the Volta River power authority project. This request was passed on to the Premier of Ontario and to Ontario Hydro's chairman, who asked Mr. Dobson to accept the challenge of the job. He did, and in his quiet, efficient way with great perseverance overcame numerous obstacles and setbacks, finishing the project ahead of schedule.

On his return from Ghana Mr. Dobson was named to the responsible position of Regional Manager at Hydro's Georgetown Bay Region at Barrie.

They were the second and third motor accident on the Silvercreek stretch of the 7th Line in two days. Saturday a truck operated by Gerald Carrier of RR 2 Acton, and a car operated by Allan Snow of RR 1 Georgetown collided doing \$375 damage.

Own Fire Department Could Be Costly: Hill

Cr. Tom Hill warned Esquesing council Tuesday night the fire marshal told them, "they would have to be prepared to pay," to set up their own fire department in the present Esquesing Fire Area No. 1.

"He said we were paying too much to Georgetown now," Cr. Pat Patterson added.

Correcting him mildly Cr. Hill claimed the fire marshal said he thought it was a bit high. He went on to tell council of a trip to fire departments at Nibleton and Schomberg, and their operations.

He stated the five men are paid five dollars a call, and a dollar a meeting and practice.

The committee will continue studying other rural fire departments.

While Cr. Tom Hill urged costs in all the fire areas of the townships be the same Cr. Pat Patterson argued that education costs all over the townships should also be the same. "People should pay the same in Norval, Limehouse, Glen Williams, etc." he challenged.

When Clerk K.C. Lindsay pointed out that this legislation was set by the province, Cr. Patterson retorted, "I don't care whether it's set by the good Lord himself. I want it changed."

Wesley Marchment, 65 was Former Georgetown Resident

Retired from Beardmore and Co. Acton, where he worked as a leather buffer, Wesley Henry Marchment, died suddenly at Guelph General Hospital July 13th. He was in his 66th year.

He and his wife were caretakers at the Bank of Nova Scotia for 20 years.

Born in Glen Williams in 1902, Mr. Marchment attended school in Georgetown. He married the former Agnes Irene Collins in Windsor in 1925. The couple had lived for the past 30 years in Acton.

He was a member of St. Joseph's R.C. Church. Requiem mass was said by his pastor, Rev. Father V. J. Morgan on Saturday morning, July 15th. Burial was in St. Joseph's cemetery.
