Mr. Treanor was married in 1941 to the former Margaret Hamilton of the Ninth Line, Hornby. He was a life long member of St. Andrew's Presbyterian Church, Streetsville where he was ordained into eldership on December 7th, 1952. Until some five years ago he was superintendent of the church Sunday School for many years. He was also a member of River Park Masonic Lodge, Streetsville.

Surviving are his wife, the former Margaret Hamilton, one son George, at home, and brothers Lorne of Windsor, Clarence and Cecil of Meadowvale and Orlo of Toronto. Rev. R. Duncanson officiated at the funeral service which was held at the Lee Funeral Home, Streetsville, on Tuesday, July 18th, at 2 p.m. with burial in the Britannia Cemetery.

Pallbearers were Ben Madill, John Johnston and his four brothers, while his ten nephews were flower bearers. Orville Don, Wapne, Tom, Allan and Bud Treanor, Garry Hamilton, Don Shea, Ron and Jim Plant, farm all his life. Would Empty Storm Sewer Into Creek

George Dick, area engineer for Wimpey Homes Ltd. and Bruce Wilson of G.V. Kleinfeld Associates of Brampton appeared before Esqueving council Tuesday seeking their approval for a storm sewer outfall into the creek down the Wildwood hill.

The company promised to maintain the sewer cut for two years, in a condition satisfactory to the township.

Both Cr. Tom Hill and Deputy Reeve Currie asked for a written permission from the Credit Valley Conservation Authority before they would agree. Mr. Wilson agreed to have this done.

Routine Duties for OPP in Week's Work

North Halton OPP report 59 general occurrences during the week of July 23 to 29 inclusive including:

2 missing juveniles, 1 later returned home and the other located in Toronto; 1 theft of parts; 1 stolen vehicle recovered for other Police Dept.; 3 liquor investigations resulting in 3 persons being charged under the Liquor Control Act. All other occurrences were of a minor nature.

Personnel of the detachment, worked a total of 820 1/4 hours and patrolled a total of 7,563 miles on area highways. As a result of patrol, 51 traffic charges were preferred, 72 traffic violation warnings were issued and 170 vehicles were safety checked. There were 59 convictions registered.

There were 4 personal injury accidents resulting in 4 persons being injured; 6 property damage accidents investigated; and approximately \$14,220 in property damage recorded. Causes of accidents were: inattentive driving, following too closely, fail to yield right of way, driver lost control, driving on wrong side of road, and speed too fast for road or traffic conditions. There were 7 charges laid under the Highway Traffic Act as a result of these accidents.

SIR CHARLES TUPPER

In 1863 a U.S. warship violated Nova Scotia's territorial waters to capture a Confederate ship that had sought asylum there, and took prisoner a Nova Scotian who was guiding the Confederate into harbour. Nova Scotia's Premier, Dr. Charles Tupper was furious. He ordered the U.S. commander to release his prisoners and the captured ship or be 'sent to the bottom' by the guns of the Halifax Citadel. The American obeyed, but the affair left Tupper with a deep uneasiness about U.S. military aggressiveness, and a conviction that the British colonies in North America must unite in their own defence.

From the time of the Charlottetown Conference the following year, Tupper formed a close relationship with Macdonald, Cartier, and Brown, becoming the champion of Confederation in his own colony.

The fight for Confederation was hard in Nova Scotia. Tupper had to face the great Reform leader Joseph Howe, who called Confederation "the Botheation Scheme," and the increasingly strong Liberal Party. Convinced that Confederation was essential not only for the defence but for the prosperity of British North America, Tupper laid his office on the line for it.

In 1866 Confederation finally got the approval of the Nova Scotia legislature and Nova Scotia became one of the four original provinces. Tupper was sent on to the new Parliament at Ottawa.

After serving as Canada's first High Commissioner to Britain, Tupper became leader of the Conservative Party and Prime Minister of Canada in 1895. A year later he went down to defeat, in the defence of another unpopular cause, the Manitoba separate schools. Bound, as in 1866, to put his career on the line for what he was convinced was best for his country, Tupper lost his office to Wilfrid Laurier and the Liberals.
