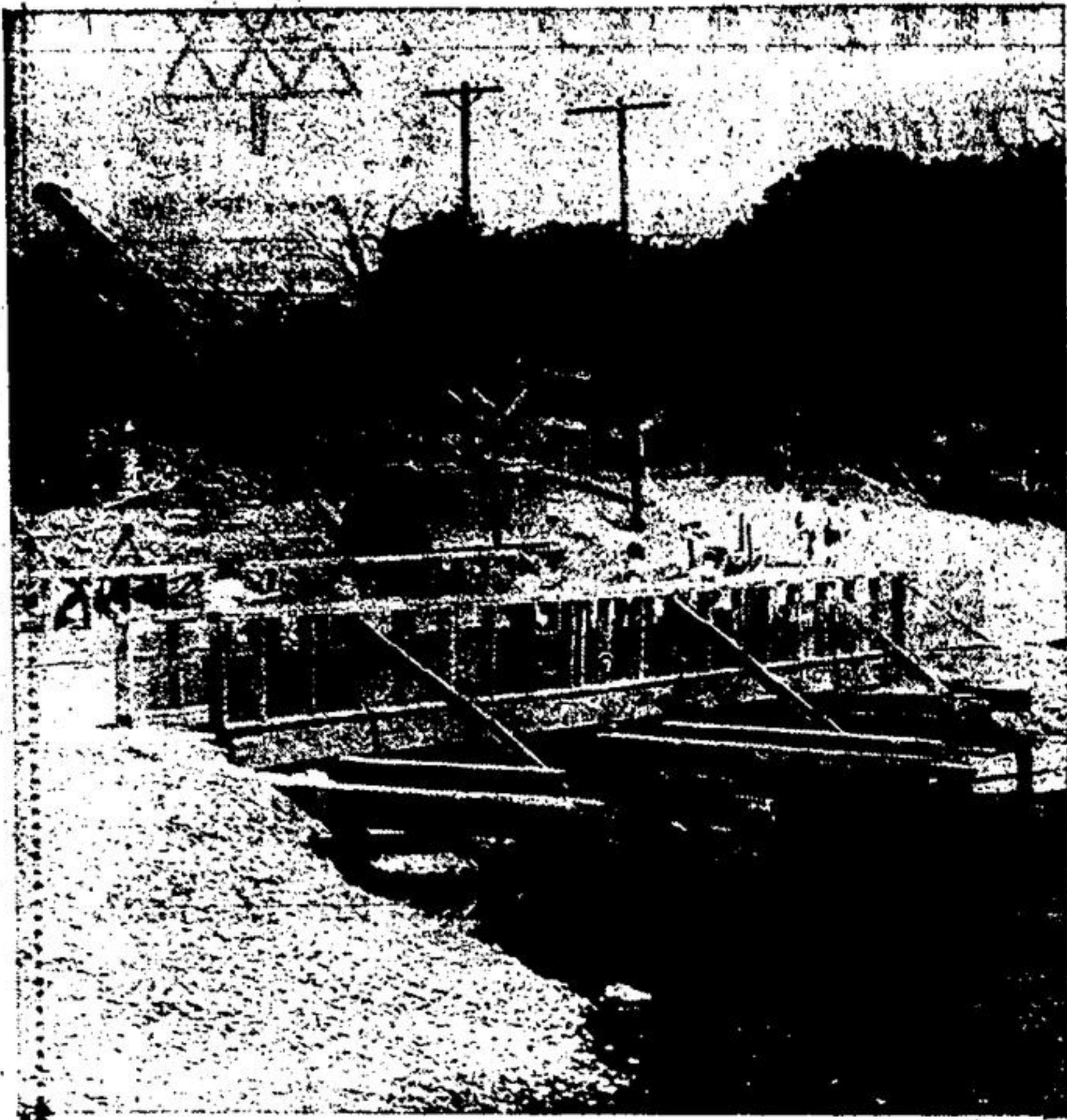
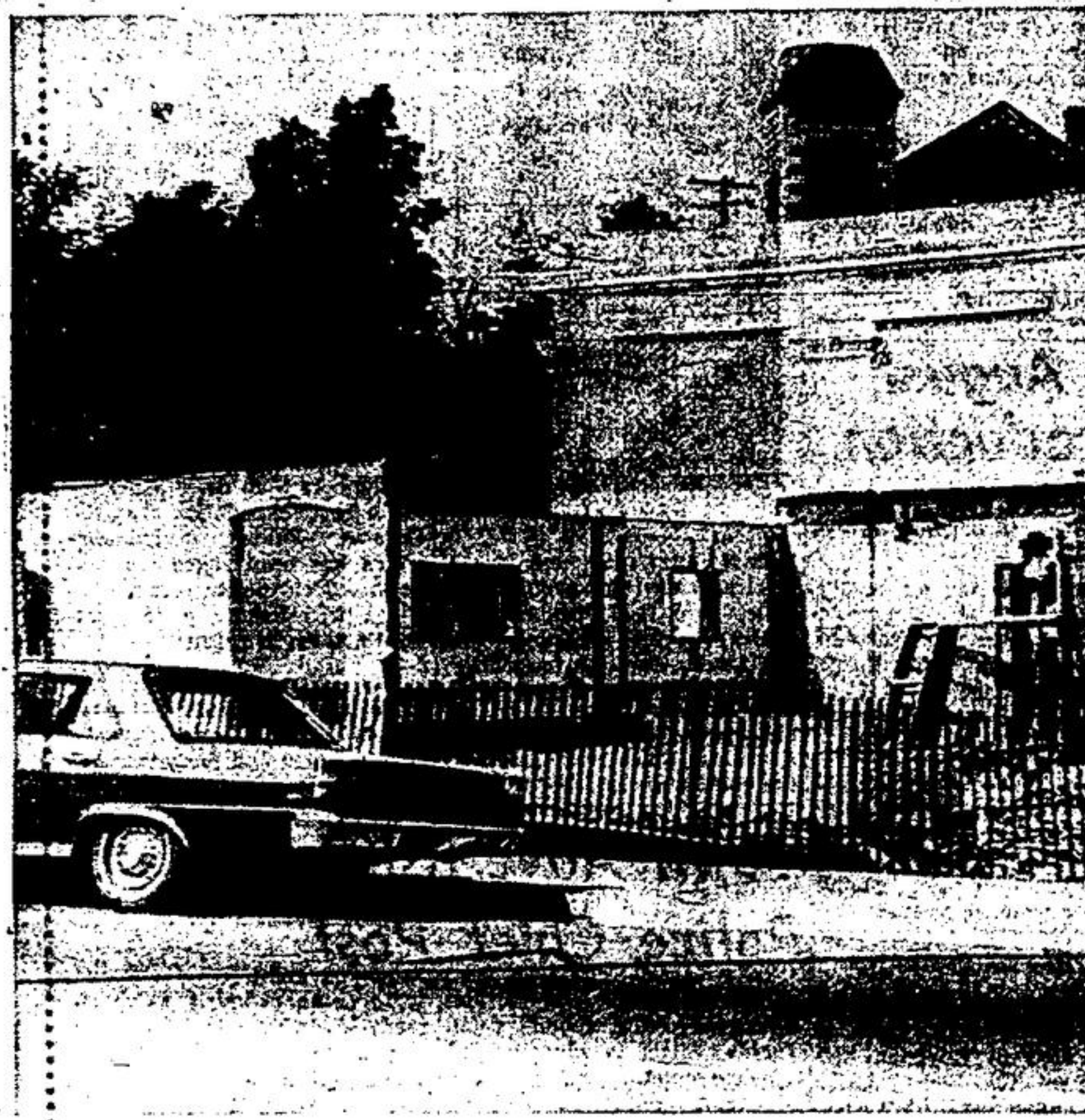

Blinkout Signal Safety Device Doing Its Job

Georgetown's electrical power was only slightly affected by a lightning storm that snapped and cracked here for a couple of hours Wednesday night, August 2.

A "cut out" burned out when struck by a lightning bolt leaving the E.W. Bliss Co. on Guelph St. without hydro for a brief period but that was the only interruption that lasted longer than a couple of seconds.

Other very short blackouts throughout the town were only signals that a safety device was doing its job.

Georgetown Hydro manager Graham Farnell said that when lightning scored direct hits on local power lines it opened an automatic circuit breaker just long enough to allow the extra power to escape.

"Then it automatically shuts and normal service is resumed," he said. Without the circuit breaker serious damage would have been done to hydro equipment.

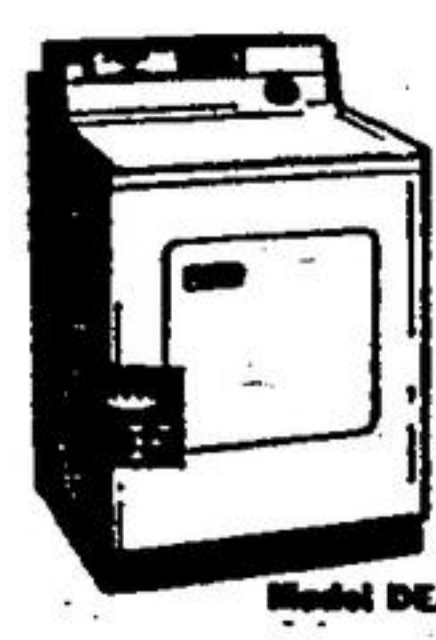
