Halton Farmers Tops In '66 DHIA Program

Halton Dairy farmers should be very proud of their R.O.P. herd averages for 1966-67.

For the Ayrshire breed, Mr. A.H. Clark, Georgetown, Ontario, has the top breed class average and milk production in Canada. His 32 cows averaged 14,060 lbs. milk, 518 lbs. of fat for a B.C.A. of 178 and 159.

For the Jersey breed in herds from 10 - 19 cows, Fred Nurse, Georgetown No. 2, is third in Canada. His 15 cows had a B.C.A. of 138 for milk, 126 for fat in herds from 20-39 cows. A. Neilson Stark and Mrs. F. Robinson, Georgetown No. 3 were 4th with B.C.A.'s of 148 and

144. Ken Ellis & Sons, Norval, were 7th with B.C.A.'s of 138 and 135. In the section for herds with over 40 cows, Maurice C. Beatty, Milton No. 4, placed 6th. His 48 cows had an average B.C.A. of 136 and 132. In the Guernsey section, the top average was achieved by J.H. Cameron, Norval, a herd of 77 cows, had 136 and 135 B.C.A. Next was John Y. Mabb, Georgetown No. 2, 2 cows 132 and 131 B.C.A.

By applying now you will receive your first payment in January 1968, when persons who have reached the age of 67 become eligible for Old Age Security.

If you were born in 1901

You should make application for your Old Age Security pension six months before your 67th birthday. An Old Age Security application form may be obtained at your local Post Office, or by writing to the Regional Director of Old Age Security in the capital city of your province. With it you will receive a pamphlet giving full information about Old Age Security.

GUARANTEED INCOME SUPPLEMENT

As soon as your Old Age Security pension is approved, you will be sent information about the Guaranteed Income Supplement and an application form. You may be entitled to a supplement which, together with your Old Age Security pension, will guarantee you a monthly income of at least \$105.00.

Elk to Join Buffalo as Halton Park Attraction

The buffalo at Rattlesnake Point are going to get company — but not for several months.

Dave Murray, of the Halton Region Conservation Authority, said recently that the elk the Authority has lined up cannot be delivered before December.

The elk will be coming from Elk Island National Park near Edmonton, Alberta. They are rounded up annually in September, and any to be shipped to other parks or zoos must remain in quarantine for at least 60 days.

If any healthy ones are shipped here, they would be turned loose in the 70-acre compound in Rattlesnake Point Canyon, where a small herd of buffalo now graze.

Mr. Murray said that at the present time, any proposals to obtain other animals — such as lynx, caribou, muskox or moose — were still in the talking stage — although he is in favor of obtaining such species.

"This would really add some interest and some character to the environment," he said.
