

# Japan - Bound Holstein Brought Record Price

Roybrook Telstar, one of the highly-rated Holstein sires in use today, left Georgetown, recently for his new home in Japan as part of a large agricultural co-operative program to Hokkaido.

He was owned by a syndicate and was bred and raised by Mr. Roy Ormiston, a leading Holstein breeder. His pedigree was exceptional in that his three maternal dams were all Excellent with unusually high production.

While the price was not disclosed it is reported to be the highest priced cash sale of a Canadian Holstein bull on record.

Telstar was shipped along with another outstanding bull, Seiling Mark (V.G.) and some other heifers via the USA to San Francisco, and from there by boat to Japan.

The occasion was marked by a gathering at the Georgetown Sales Arena prior to departure of the animals attended by officials of the Holstein-Friesian Association of Canada, the Holstein-Friesian Journal, and leading Holstein breeders. A luncheon followed at the North Halton Golf & Country Club, hosted by Rockwood International Ltd., who transacted the sale and handled the shipping arrangements.

## Highway Hospitality Twelve Ways Show

Twelve ways to show hospitality on the highway this Centennial summer have been announced by the Canadian Highway Safety Council.

The Council is urging Canadian motorists to drive like good hosts, in view of the expected influx of visiting motorists. In addition to winning goodwill for Canada, courteous driving will lower the accident rate.

**12 Ways to Show Hospitality:**  
(Here are 12 ways car drivers can show hospitality on the highway:

- 1) Be ready to give directions, when asked.
- 2) Make allowances for a visitor who does not know local traffic rules.
- 3) Stop to see if you can help when a motorist seems to be in trouble.
- 4) Always lower your high beam lights when meeting a car.
- 5) Don't tailgate.

6) Don't cut in.  
7) Always use directional signals or hand signals when moving from lane to lane, or turning.  
8) If a motorist falls to yield, don't insist on your right of way (Remember the lines "he was right, dead right, as he sped along, but he's just as dead as if he were wrong.")  
9) When another car moves to pass don't make it more difficult by speeding up. (Would you walk faster if someone passed you on the street?)  
10) When a passing driver seeks a place in your lane, slow down and let him in.

### Ottawan Coming as Assessment Chief

J. Marshall Bain, 27, will succeed C.J. Hibbert as Georgetown's assessment commissioner August 21.

Mr. Bain was hired by council on Thursday night. He was one of three men interviewed at a committee meeting the previous night. His salary will be \$7,000 plus a \$500 car allowance.

Mr. Bain is presently with the assessment department in Ottawa.

Since Mr. Hibbert resigned to take a new position with the Peel County department, assessor Tom James has been acting commissioner.

The motion to hire Mr. Bain carried 7-1 with one dissenting vote from Cr. Jim Young. Cr. Roy Ballentine was not present at the meeting.

## Will Grow Soya Beans to Feed Herd of 90 Guernseys

The Halton and Peel Senior Dairy and Calf Club members toured the farm of Hartley and J.D. Cameron, and the Flowerlea Co-operative, Brampton, on Thursday, August 3rd. At the Cameron farm they were given an insight into the present farm operation and why the farm buildings had recently been modernized. The facilities of the conventional barn proved inadequate about three years ago, and the new single storey dairy barn was built to meet their requirements. The barn went into operation last fall and has tie-up facilities for ninety head of cattle. A pipeline milker is used to assist in getting the milk from the cow to the bulk storage tank. The Camerons, who are Guernsey breeders, are on R.O.P. as a method of testing the performance of their dairy cows. They grow much of the food consumed by the livestock, and in future plan to grow their own protein supplement in the form of soya beans. Corn, hay, and soya beans would then make up the

complete dairy ration, eliminating the grain which is presently being fed.

At the Flowerlea Dairy in Brampton, Mr. Ginter manager of the dairy co-operative, discussed the operation, maintaining that the dairy was owned by twenty farmers in the Brampton area, nineteen of whom ship their milk to this plant. These nineteen shippers comprise the total fluid milk source of this dairy. After explaining the methods of operation for the plant, Mr. Ginter and his plant supervisor divided the group for tours of the entire operation.

## Unique Design for New Bridge at Glen

The new bridge now being constructed over the Credit River branch on the east side of Glen Williams will probably be unique in Ontario according to the Halton county engineering department.

The thing that makes it different is the design. County engineer D.J. Corbett explained that because of the urban surroundings, the grade and approach to the bridge cannot be altered and thus special construction must be used.

The bridge will be a pre-stressed rigid frame.

Mr. Corbett said construction will be finished sometime in November. He said it will cost about \$158,000.
