No. 1 — Mountainview and Guelph. Four lanes on the highway, two on Mountainview. With some motorists using the wrong lanes on the highway, cars using Mountainview are in an awkward position in crossing not knowing what oncoming traffic will, or intend to do. Hence we get an expensive accident as a result which could have been a fatal one.

No. 2 — Maple Ave. and Guelph. The craziest intersection in town. Four lanes on highway, narrowing down to two, within a few yards east of intersection. Same trouble met there as at No. 1, but with the addition of an "island" stuck in the centre of the road, the nuttiest idea ever thought of and which since it was put there has caused more accidents than enough.

No. 3 — Main Street South and Maple Ave. W. Situated in a valley at its lowest point, surrounded by high banks obstructing view of traffic in all directions.

Another intersection worth watching will be King and Mountainview when the new bridge is placed over the CNR tracks.
