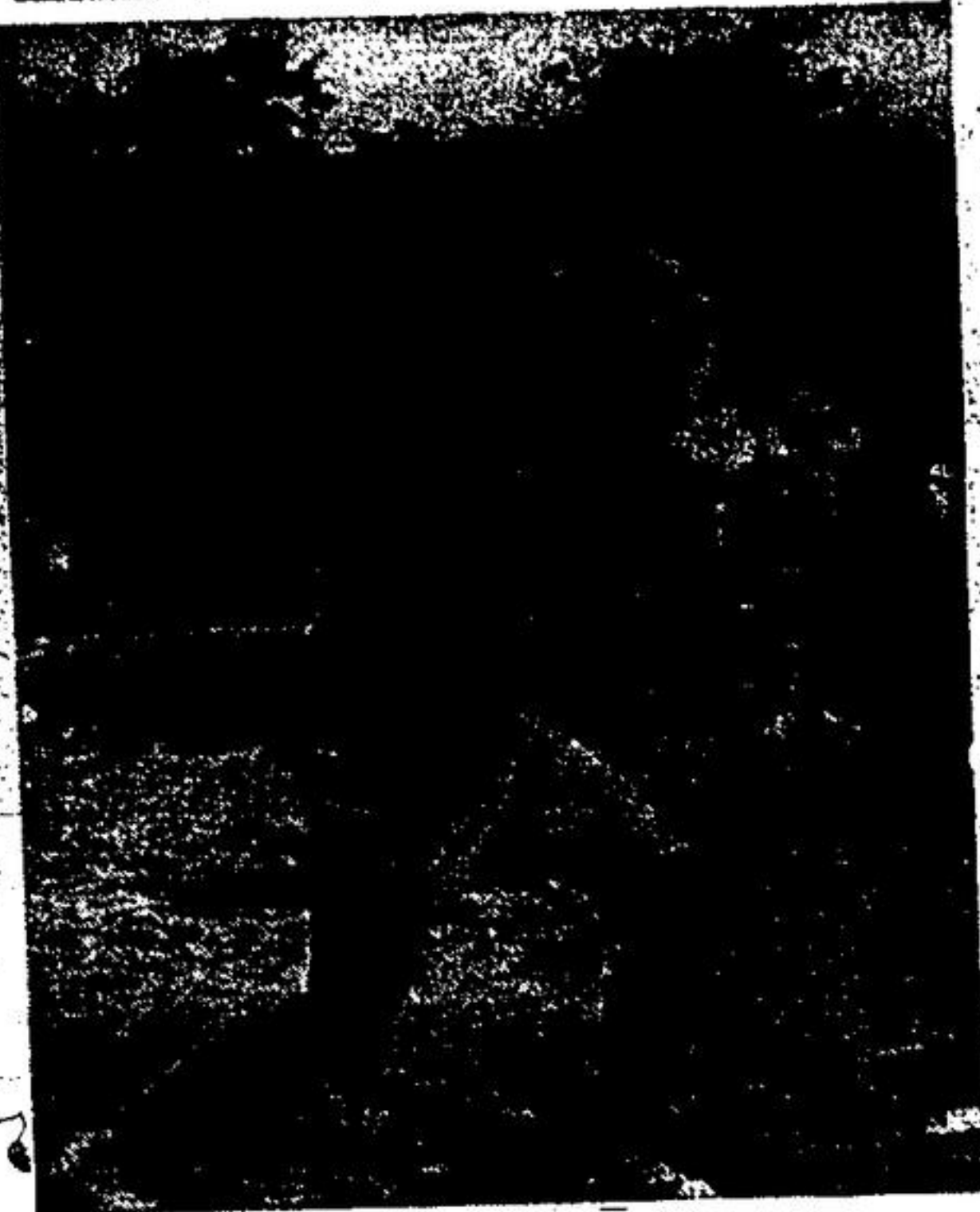


Swish . . . . . Ouch!
