**Growing County Means Higher Road Expenses Says Engineer**

More money allocated to roads in the county was forecast by Warden William Coulter at Halton County council meeting last week.  
 Agreeing with him Reeve Herb Hinton of Acton urged constant review of the roads, with some being taken over by the county, and some dropped from the county system.  
 A detailed report by County Engineer D. J. Corbett confirmed the warden's forecast, saying, "Our road system is wearing out, in some areas, at a rate which will make substantially increased expenditures necessary in the future, if we are to keep pace with the needs and demands of traffic."  
 The engineer claimed the rapid development in Halton has outstripped the work on roads, and listed one road which in spite of extensive repairs is still only a class 'B' highway. To bring it up to requirements for the traffic it bears would cost up to \$200,000.  
 Under the "construction" heading, the list of work done, or being done, showed Esquesing and Georgetown's share of county work to be a large one.  
 The report stated the lower bridge in Glen Williams was completed, and the construction of the upper bridge underway. A new bridge at Stewarttown on the 15th Side-road of Esquesing, and 700 ft of grading was finished last month. Reconstruction and paving of part of the 7th Line was completed last year, and the Hornby east diversion adjacent to and along the 7th Lane would start soon.

**Sisters Combine Forces to Open New Business**

Two sisters, Mrs. Martin Adema and Mrs. Ed Schipper will launch their first business venture this coming week-end with the opening of the Golden Fish and Chip store on Main St. right next to the municipal building.
