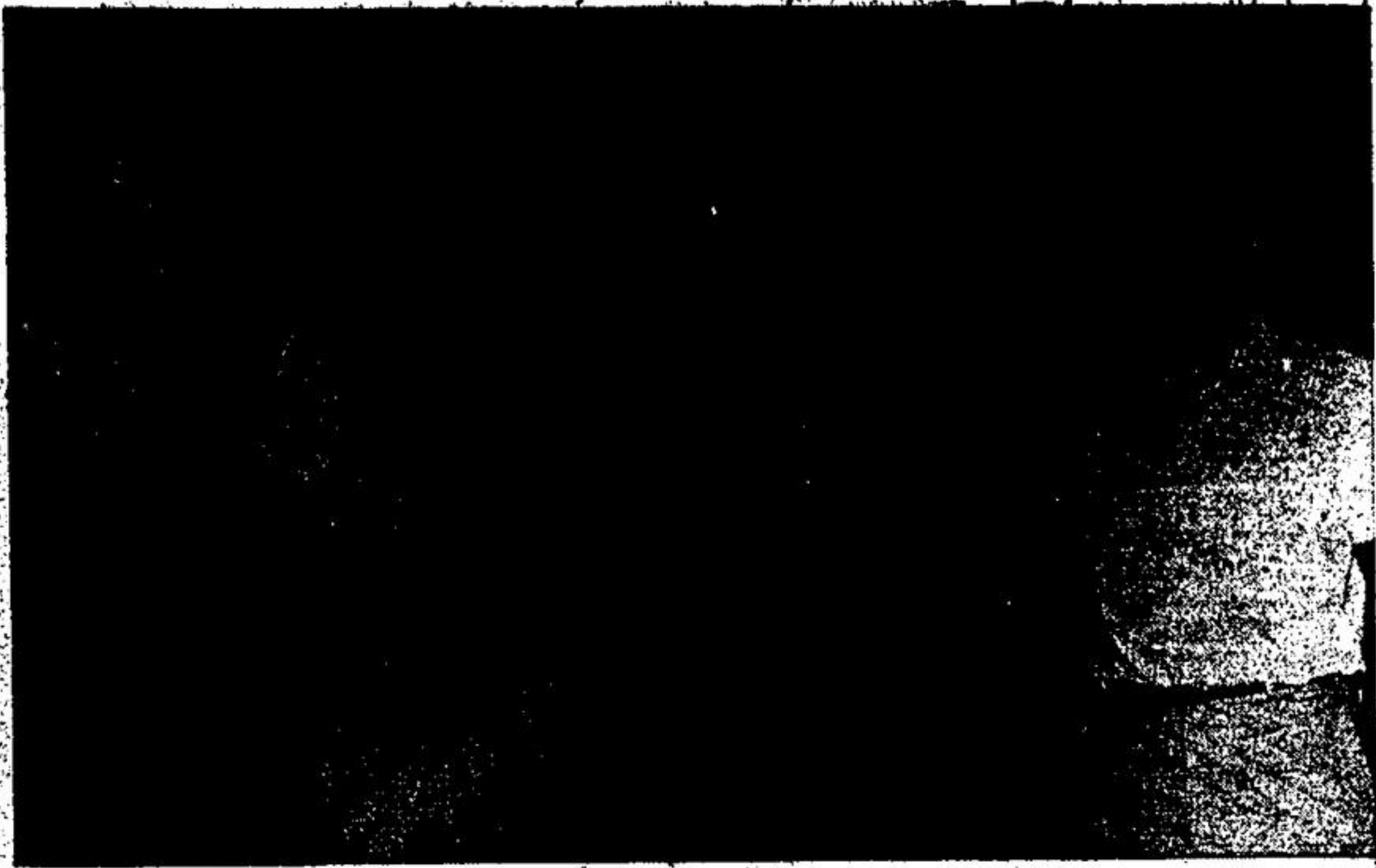
Mrs. Geo. Hughes, 53 Was Yorkshire Native

Twenty students from the North York secondary school system will be involved in a 7 day study at Georgetown and the Credit valley. From August 21 to the 29th. The participants in the North York summer school enrichment program will be visiting areas between Port Credit and Orangeville, concentrating on the Georgetown area.

The purpose of the field studies program is to remove the students from the realm of the classroom and the textbook and place them in a learning situation achieved by direct contact with the landscape.
