# Would Convert County to New System of Assessment

County assessor Robert Beach at the suggestion of County Council, is visiting each municipal council in Halton to outline being studied by the county's finance and assessment committee. Within the next few weeks Mr. Beach will explain it to each council so they can give some direction to their county representatives for a vote at the county level possibly this fall.

Main benefits of a countywide assessing system, he said. are a more uniform assessment on all properties, the implementation of data processing, a more equitable cost sharing between municipalities, and the switch to a new assessing man-

An electric data processing unit would be purchased immediately to compute all assessments and set up tax rolls for each municipality, Mr Beach explained. In the second year of a county assessing operation, the assessors could begin to switch over to a new assessments on the current (1966) resale value -- not the 1940 base level which is presently in use.

To date 28 of Ontario's 38 counties and districts have changed from the local assessor system to a county set-up.

Presently assessing staffs throughout Halton would be em ployed by the county department, working in various muni cipalities whenever they are needed. For the benefit of ratepayers with queries, staffers could give guidance in local offices in each municipality on a certain day each week. Sub offices would probably be established in Oakville and Burling ton, where around 75 per cent of the county's total properties are located.

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


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
