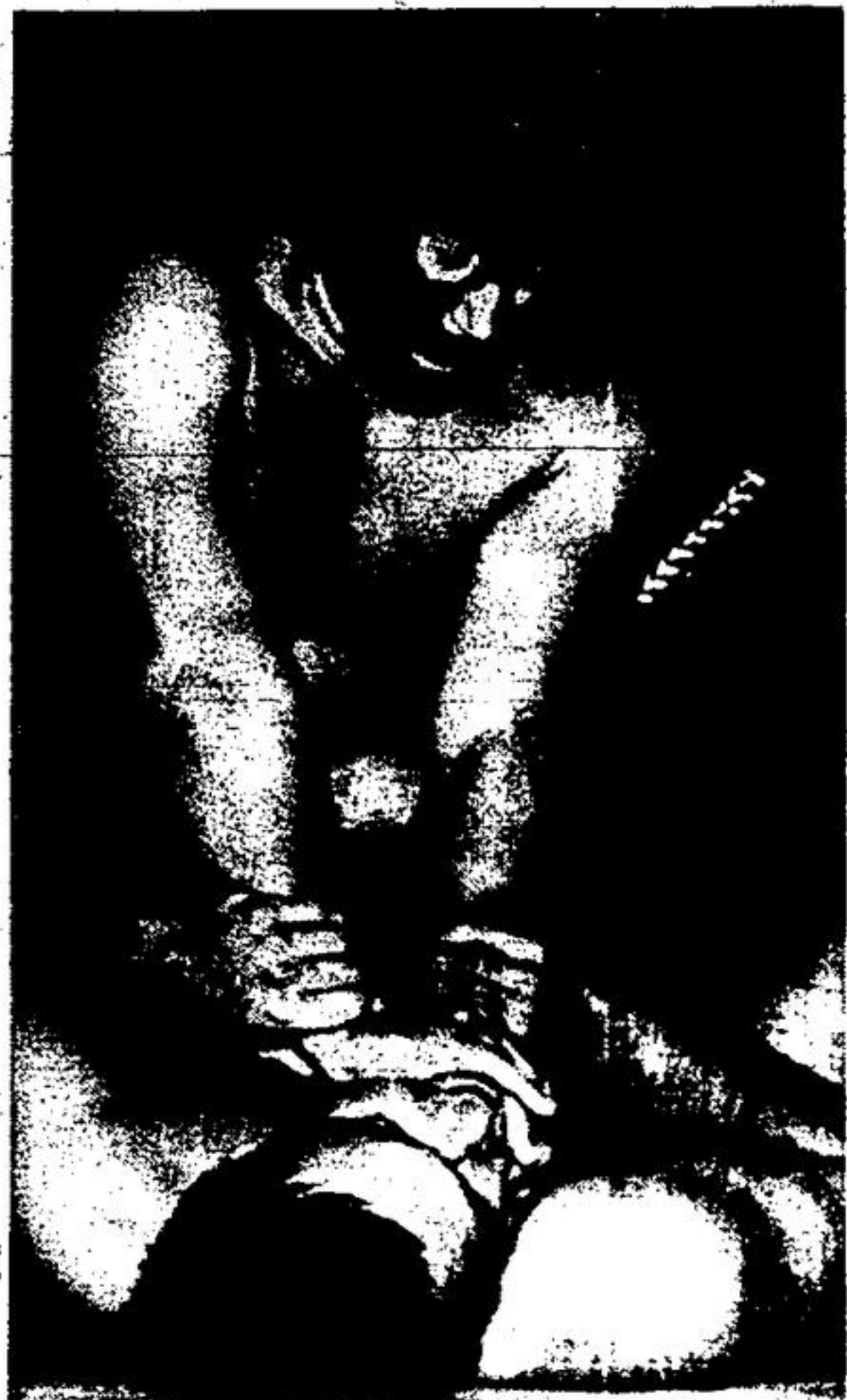
This was the comedy relief, for the evening, with the Midgets putting on a dazzling display of acrobatics ending up with them picking up their large team mates on their shoulders.
