Directors Nix Plan for Trust Company Takeover

Directors of Halton & Peel Trust Company, at a meeting Tuesday, unanimously turned down a purchase offer from Security Capital Corporation. Shareholders are being advised by letter of the decision.

"We're not for sale," said O. M. Manning, after hearing that a Toronto-based company was making a move to take over Halton & Peel Trust Company, which has a branch in Georgetown.

"They'll run into a real hornet's nest of their people with their plans," the Halton Peel president added.

This was the reaction which followed the announcement that Security Capital Corporation Ltd. of Toronto, had made an offer to purchase 25 per cent of the shares of Halton & Peel Trust Company. The offer was made on the basis of the company's 1965 earnings of \$2,100,000 and a 1966 profit of \$2,400,000.

Security Capital Corporation, which is a subsidiary of the Ontario-based bank, has been in the market for some time, offering to buy a number of companies in the financial services field.

Halton & Peel Trust Company, which has a branch in Georgetown, has a long history of service to the community. The company was founded in 1888 and has since then grown to become one of the largest financial institutions in the region.

The company's assets include a large portfolio of real estate, as well as a significant amount of cash and securities. The offer from Security Capital Corporation was seen as a major development in the company's history.
