Speed Limit Favourable Reception, Says Young

Peter Jones returned to Georgetown again this week to criticize the thirty mile an hour speed limit on Guelph St. to the town limits.

"You said it was a police recommendation," he began, "if the police had their way we would all be walking in straight lines."

He claimed it was not the speed which was dangerous, but the badly marked intersections, and suggested arrows on the road where left hand turns are made.

Cr. Jim Young contended he had ten favourable comments for every complaint he had received. "We used to have an average of two accidents a week, with half involving property damage, the other half personal injury, since this speed limit has been in effect we've had none."

Cr. W. Smith backed Cr. Young, stating the three different limits, previously enforced, were much more dangerous than the thirty mile all the way through.

Plan Extensive Repairs to Township Municipal Building

Extensive repairs to the four-year-old township administrative building will probably be undertaken this Fall, members of Esqueving Township Council decided last week.

They authorized Joe Winder of Blue Chip Building Restorations, Milton, to bring in a cost estimate on the necessary repairs for their September meeting. The firm had inspected the building and recommended replacement of about 2000 cracked and defective bricks, repointing of open mortar joints, sealing of mortar joints with a synthetic rubber, installation of flashings under all the sills, installation of expansion joints on the sills and an application of silicone to waterproof the building.

Mr. Winder said leaks in the building, and a white salt pearing on the interior walls was mainly an architectural fault. Water is penetrating the brick through the mortar joints, they explained.

In other business, the council instructed the Treasurer to bill trailer owners at a Norval trailer camp for taxes.

Decided to review staff salaries, holiday periods and mileage payments annually, following a request for a raise from one staffer.

Learned the township's share of warning signals at the Five Sideroad CNR crossing would be 12 1/2 percent of the total \$15,000 cost.

Allan Wheeler, of Prince St., Glen Williams, and David Hunter of Streetsville escaped injury, when their cars collided on Mountainview Road near the town's northern limits.

Hunter's car was a write-off, Wheeler's received \$500 damage.

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
